### **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Constellation Schools: Puritas Community Elementary, Cuyahoga County, Ohio (the School), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2012, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the School's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the School, as of June 30, 2012, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated November 27, 2012, on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis information on pages 3 through 7 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Government Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of the financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

## **Management's Discussion and Analysis**

For the Year Ended June 30, 2012

The discussion and analysis of Constellation Schools: Puritas Community Elementary (PTCE) financial performance provides an overall review of financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the financial performance of PTCE as a whole. Readers should also review the Notes to the Financial Statements and the Financial Statements to enhance their understanding of the financial performance of PTCE.

### **Financial Highlights**

Key financial highlights for 2012 include the following:

- In total, net assets decreased \$34,477, which represents a 2.7% decrease from 2011. This decrease is due primarily to decreased federal stimulus funding and minor state grants for the school offset partially by increased state basic aid for increased enrollment.
- Total assets decreased \$36,371, which represents a 2.8% decrease from 2011. This is due to decreased cash and capital assets partially offset by increased loans receivable and prepaid expenses.
- Liabilities decreased \$1,894, which represents a 12.4% decrease from 2011. Vendor payables decreased while deferred revenues increased.
- Operating revenues increased by \$44,525, which represents a 2.8% increase from 2011. This increase is a result of increases in the state foundation reduced by insurance proceeds from a damage claim in 2011 and reduced rental income.
- Expenses increased by \$43,950 which represents a 2.3% increase from 2011. Operating expense increases are due primarily to additional personnel and annual personnel increases plus purchases of additional services and supplies and is partially reduced by building repairs from storm damage that occurred in 2011.
- Non-operating revenues decreased by \$205,899, which represents a 38.7% decrease from 2011. This decrease is due to the expiration of federal stimulus funds and minor state grants.

### **Using this Financial Report**

This report consists of three parts, Management's Discussion and Analysis, the Financial Statements and the Notes to the Financial Statements. The Financial Statements include a Statement of Net Assets, a Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets and a Statement of Cash Flows.

### Statement of Net Assets

The Statement of Net Assets looks at how well PTCE has performed financially through June 30, 2012. This statement includes all of the assets, liabilities and net assets using the accrual basis of accounting, which is the accounting method used by most private-sector companies. This basis of accounting takes into account all revenues earned and expenses incurred during the year, regardless as to when the cash is received or expended.

Net assets decreased \$34,477, due to reduction in federal stimulus funds. For assets, cash decreased \$311,979; prepaid expenses increased \$13,889; due from other governments decreased \$103; loans receivable increased \$262,350 and net capital assets decreased \$528 from 2011. For liabilities, accounts payable decreased \$2,194 and deferred revenues increased \$300 from 2011.

Net assets decreased in fiscal year ending June 30, 2012 and increased in fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. These changes are due primarily to enrollment changes, federal stimulus funds and damage repairs in 2011 that was only partially covered by insurance proceeds. Although certain expenditures such as salaries will increase or decrease as the number of classes increase or decrease other costs remain fixed such as facilities costs resulting in more efficient operations. Additionally, grants have been received to supplement various educational programs.

Revenues decreased from the previous year by a total of \$161,374. The most significant changes in revenues from 2011 to 2012 are increases of \$93,979 in Foundation funding due to formula changes an enrollment increases and a decrease of \$215,920 in federal stimulus funding and minor state grants provided to the school through the state of Ohio. Other Operating Revenues decreases include rental income \$24,000 and an insurance claim for property damages totaling \$25,000. Interest earned increased \$10,021 from loans to other schools.

In total expenses increased \$43,950 from 2011 to 2012. Salaries and Fringe Benefits increased \$98,249 due to increased staff and annual increases. Purchased services decreased \$60,842 due to a \$59,072 insurance claim for building repairs in 2011. Materials and Supplies decreased \$4,279 due to reduced purchases of text books and Capital Outlay increased \$7,275 due to purchases of classroom technology, furniture and equipment. Depreciation decreased \$1,342 as a result of assets becoming fully depreciated during the year. Other Operating Expenses increased \$4,889 due to increases in audit fees and insurance premiums.

### Capital Assets

As of June 30, 2012, PTCE had \$35,015 invested in computers, technology, furniture and equipment, net of depreciation. This is a \$528 decrease from June 30, 2011.

### **Current Financial Issues**

Constellation Schools: Puritas Community Elementary (PTCE) opened in the fall of 2003. It has grown from 61 students, five teaching staff members and expenses of \$493,819 to a total of 201 students, 22 teaching staff members and expenses of \$1,989,642. During the 2007 school year grades 5 and 6 were split off to form Puritas Community Middle School which is providing more flexibility in the curriculum for each student and will improve our options for limited facilities space. Despite this change, enrollment continued to increase due to the natural growth of the lower grades.

PTCE subleased its facility until May, 2007 when the lessor abandoned their lease. In order to remain in the building, PTCE accepted assignment of the lease from the previous lessor. As a result, occupancy costs increases in excess of \$150,000 from prior years will continue until the lease expires in December 2013. PTCE subleases a portion of its space to the middle school with lease amounts determined by the amount of space used by the school.

During the past year as the nation has experienced a major economic downturn, the Board of Directors, school management and school staff have worked diligently to ensure that the school maintains the high level of educational services and financial integrity that we have always provided. Our goal is to provide a strong educational product for our students and families and to maintain the reputation we have developed during our previous years.

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**I. Description of the School and Reporting Entity**

**Constellation Schools: Puritas Community Elementary** (PTCE), originally Euclid Community School (EUCS) and previously operating as Puritas Community School, is a nonprofit corporation established October 17, 2001 pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 3314 and 1702 to maintain and provide a school exclusively for any educational, literary, scientific and related teaching service that qualifies as an exempt organization under §501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. On May 5, 2003, PTCE (as EUCS) received a determination letter confirming tax-exempt status with the Internal Revenue Service under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the tax-exempt status of PTCE. PTCE, which is part of Ohio's education program, is independent of any school district. PTCE may sue and be sued, acquire facilities as needed, and contract for any services necessary for the operation of PTCE.

PTCE (as EUCS) was approved for operation under a contract between the Governing Authority of PTCE (as EUCS) and the Ohio Department of Education (the Sponsor) for a period of five years commencing July 1, 2002 and terminating on June 30, 2007. On May 13, 2003, the name of the school was changed to Puritas Community School. On October 16, 2003 PTCE entered into a contract with Lucas County Educational Service Center (LCESC) to have LCESC replace the Ohio Department of Education as their sponsor. The contract with LCESC, now known as ESC of Lake Erie West (ESCLEW) has been renewed with a current expiration date of June 30, 2022. Under the terms of the contract LCESC will provide sponsorship services for a fee. See Note XII for further discussion of the sponsor services. PTCE entered into an agreement with Constellation Schools (CS) to provide management services for the fiscal year. See Note XII for further discussion of this management agreement. On March 27, 2007 the school name was changed to Constellation Schools: Puritas Community Elementary.

PTCE operates under a six member Board of Directors. The Board is responsible for carrying out the provisions of the contract, which include, but are not limited to, state mandated provisions regarding student population, curriculum, academic goals, performance standards, admission standards, and qualification of teachers. The Board of Directors controls PTCE's instructional facility, staffed by twenty-two certificated full time teaching personnel who provide services to 201 students. During 2012, the board members for PTCE also serve as the board for Constellation Schools: Puritas Community Middle.

**II. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

The financial statements of PTCE have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental nonprofit organizations. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles to its governmental activities provided they do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. PTCE also

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applies Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations issued on or before November 30, 1989, to its proprietary activities unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. PTCE has elected not to follow FASB guidance issued after November 30, 1989 for its proprietary activities. The more significant of PTCE's accounting policies are described below.

**1. Basis of Presentation**

Enterprise accounting is used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges or where it has been decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability or other purposes.

**2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting**

The accounting and financial reporting treatment is determined by its measurement focus. Enterprise accounting uses a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities are included on the Statement of Net Assets. Operating statements present increases (e.g., revenues) and decreases (e.g., expenses) in net total assets.

Basis of accounting determines when transactions are recorded in the financial records and reported on the financial statements. PTCE prepares financial statements using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded when the exchange takes place. Revenues resulting from non-exchange transactions, in which PTCE receives value without directly giving equal value in return, such as grants and entitlements, are recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the fiscal year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when the use is first permitted; matching requirements, in which PTCE must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose; and expenditure requirements, in which resources are provided to PTCE on a reimbursement basis. Expenses are recognized at the time they are incurred.

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**3. Cash**

All monies received by PTCE are deposited in demand deposit accounts.

**4. Budgetary Process**

Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapter 5705.391 PTCE prepares and adopts an annual budget which includes estimated revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year and a five year forecast of revenues and expenditures. PTCE will from time to time adopt budget revisions as necessary.

**5. Due From Other Governments**

Monies due PTCE for the year ended June 30, 2012 are recorded as Due From Other Governments. A current asset for the receivable amount is recorded at the time of the event causing the monies to be due.

**6. Capital Assets and Depreciation**

Capital assets are capitalized at cost and updated for additions and retirements during the year. Donated fixed assets are recorded at their fair market values as of the dates received. All items with a useful life of one year or greater and a value of \$500 or more are capitalized. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized.

All capital assets are depreciated. Depreciation of building improvements, computers, office equipment and furniture and equipment is computed using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives. Improvements to fixed assets are depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related fixed assets. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

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**7. Intergovernmental Revenues**

PTCE currently participates in the State Foundation Program and the State Poverty Based Assistance Program. Revenues received from these programs are recognized as operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met. PTCE also participates in Federal Entitlement Programs, the Federal Lunch Reimbursement Program, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, Education Jobs, Race to the Top and various State Grant Programs. State and Federal Grants and Entitlements are recognized as non-operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met. Amounts awarded under the above named programs for the 2012 school year totaled \$1,797,813.

**8. Private Grants and Contributions**

PTCE received grants and contributions from private sources to support the schools programs. Private grants and contributions are recognized as non-operating revenues in the accounting period in which they are received. PTCE did not receive any grants or contributions for the 2012 school year.

**9. Compensated Absences**

Vacation is taken in a manner which corresponds with the school calendar; therefore, PTCE does not accrue vacation time as a liability.

Sick leave benefits are earned at the rate of one and one-quarter day per month and can be accrued up to a maximum of one hundred twenty days. PTCE will accept the transfer of sick days from another school district up to the maximum accrual amount. No financial accrual for sick time is made since unused sick time is not paid to employees upon employment termination.

**10. Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

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**11. Deferred Revenue**

Deferred revenue arises when assets are recognized before revenue recognition criteria have been satisfied. The deferred revenue for PTCE consists of materials fees received in the current year which pertains to the next school year.

**III. Deposits**

At fiscal year end June 30, 2012, the carrying amount of PTCE's deposits totaled \$890,968 and its bank balance was \$914,707. Based on the criteria described in GASB Statement No. 40, "Deposit and Investment Risk Disclosure," as of June 30, 2012, \$664,707 of the bank balance was exposed to custodial risk as discussed below, while \$250,000 was covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of bank failure, PTCE will not be able to recover the deposits. All deposits are collateralized with eligible securities in amounts equal to at least 105% of the carrying value of the deposits. Such collateral, as permitted by the Ohio Revised Code, is held in single financial institution collateral pools at the Federal Reserve Banks or at member banks of the federal reserve system, in the name of the respective depository bank and pledged as a pool of collateral against all of the public deposits it holds or as specific collateral held at the Federal Reserve Bank in the name of PTCE.

**VI. Operating Leases**

PTCE subleased its facilities from Sovereign Day Care, LLC (Sovereign) under a one-year sublease agreement effective August 1, 2003 that was renewed annually. In May, 2007 Sovereign abandoned its lease with Puritas Plaza Partnership (Owner). In order to remain in the building and to obtain all of the space previously occupied by Sovereign, PTCE was required by Owner to assume the balance of Sovereigns' lease. Under the terms of the assumption, the lease period was from June 1, 2007 through July 31, 2011 and could not be cancelled. PTCE was also required to pay Owner unpaid rent and water for the month of May, 2007. In August 2010 the lease was extended through December 31, 2013 at a monthly cost of \$18,833. Lease payments recorded for the year ended June 30, 2012 totaled \$226,000.



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At the time of the abandonment of the lease by Sovereign, PTCE had a balance of \$119,450 in unpaid Leasehold Improvements due to Sovereign. As of May 31, 2007, PTCE has written-off the remaining balance of Leasehold Improvements Payable and has also reduced capitalized Leasehold Improvements by the same amount. The depreciable life of the remaining leasehold improvements has been adjusted to reflect the new contract term.

**VII. Loans Receivable**

On June 30, 2011 PTCE executed two unsecured promissory notes with Constellation Schools: Madison Community Elementary (MDCE) in the amount of \$200,000 and Constellation Schools: Stockyard Community Middle (SCM) in the amount of \$150,000. Each note carries interest at 4% per annum. Interest only was charged through September 30, 2011 at which time interest and principal payments began. Payments will be based on a five year amortization schedule with a balloon payment for the principal balance due at June 30, 2012. At the June 2012 board meeting the PTCE board voted to extend the notes under the same amortization schedule through June 30, 2013 at which time the remaining principal balance will be due. As of June 30, 2012, principal balances on the notes are \$165,104 for MDCE and \$129,324 for SCM.

**VIII. Risk Management**

**1. Property and Liability Insurance**

PTCE is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. For fiscal year 2012, PTCE contracted with Indiana Insurance Company for all of its insurance.

General property and liability is covered at \$10,000,000 single occurrence limit and \$11,000,000 aggregated. Hired and Non-Owned Vehicles are covered at \$1,000,000 combined single limit of liability. Other coverage includes Employee Crime, School Leaders Errors & Omissions, Sexual Abuse and Misconduct, Electronic Data Processing and Business Interruption. Settled claims have not exceeded this coverage in any of the past three years, nor has there been any significant reduction in insurance coverage from the prior year.

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**2. Workers' Compensation**

PTCE makes premium payments to the Ohio Worker's Compensation System for employee injury coverage. There has been one claim filed by PTCE employees with the Ohio Worker's Compensation System between January 1, 2003 and June 30, 2012. The total payments made for these claims have been \$676. In the opinion of management, these claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of WCE as June 30, 2012.

**3. Employee Medical, Dental, Vision and Life Benefits**

PTCE provides medical, dental, vision and life insurance benefits to all full time employees. Employees participate in premium payments through pretax payroll deductions. Total insurance benefits paid by PTCE for the fiscal year is \$126,223.

**IX. Defined Benefit Pension Plans**

**1. State Teachers Retirement System**

PTCE participates in the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio), a cost sharing, multiple-employer public employee retirement system. STRS Ohio provides retirement and disability benefits to members and death and survivor benefits to beneficiaries. STRS Ohio issues a stand-alone comprehensive annual financial report that may be obtained by writing to STRS Ohio, 275 E. Broad St., Columbus, Ohio 43215-3371, by calling toll-free 1-888-227-7877, or by visiting the STRS website at [www.strsoh.org](http://www.strsoh.org).

New members have a choice of three retirement plan options. In addition to the Defined Benefit (DB) Plan, new members are offered a Defined Contribution (DC) Plan and a Combined Plan. The DC Plan allows members to allocate all their member contributions and employer contributions equal to 10.5% of earned compensation among various investment choices. The Combined Plan offers features of the DC Plan and the DB Plan. In the Combined Plan, member contributions are allocated to investment choices by the member, and employer contributions are used to fund a defined benefit payment at a reduced level from the regular DB Plan. Contributions into the DC Plan and the Combined Plan are credited to member accounts as employers submit their payroll information to STRS Ohio, generally on a biweekly basis. DC and Combined Plan members will transfer to the DB plan during their fifth year of membership unless they permanently select the DC or Combined Plan.

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The DB Plan benefits are established under Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code. Any member may retire who has (i) five years of service credit and attained age 60; (ii) 25 years of service credit and attained age 55; or (iii) 30 years of service credit regardless of age. The annual retirement allowance, payable for life, is the greater of the "formula benefit" or the "money-purchase benefit" calculation. Under the "formula benefit," the retirement allowance is based on years of credited service and final average salary, which is the average of the members' three highest salary years. The annual allowance is calculated by using a base percentage of 2.2% multiplied by the total number of years of service credit (including Ohio-valued purchased credit) times the final average salary. The 31<sup>st</sup> year of earned Ohio service credit is calculated at 2.5%. An additional one-tenth of a percent is added to the calculation for every year of earned Ohio service over 31 years until 100% of the final average salary is reached. For members with 35 or more years of Ohio contributing service, the first 30 years will be calculated at 2.5% instead of 2.2%. Under the "money-purchase benefit" calculation, a member's lifetime contributions plus interest at specified rates are matched by an equal amount from other STRS Ohio funds. The total is then divided by an actuarially determined annuity factor to determine the maximum annual retirement allowance. Benefits are increased annually by 3% of the original base amount for DB Plan participants.

DC Plan benefits are established under Sections 3307.80 to 3307.89 of the Ohio Revised Code. For members who select the DC Plan, all member contributions and employer contributions at a rate of 10.5% are placed in an investment account. The member determines how to allocate the member and employer money among various investment choices. A member is eligible to receive a retirement benefit at age 50 and termination of employment. The member may elect to receive a lifetime monthly annuity or a lump sum withdrawal. Employer contributions into members' accounts are vested after the first anniversary of the first day of paid service. Members in the DC Plan who become disabled are entitled only to their account balance. If a member dies before retirement benefits begin, the members' designated beneficiary is entitled to receive the member's account balance.

Member contributions in the Combined Plan are allocated by the member, and employer contributions are used to fund a defined benefit payment. A members' defined benefit is determined by multiplying 1% of the members' final average salary by the members' years of service credit. The defined portion of the Combined Plan is payable to a member on or after age 60. The defined contribution portion of the account may be taken as a lump sum or converted to a lifetime monthly annuity at age 50.

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A retiree of STRS Ohio or another Ohio public retirement system is eligible for reemployment following the elapse of two months from the date of retirement. Contributions are made by the reemployed member and employer during reemployment. Upon termination of reemployment or age 65, whichever comes later, the retiree is eligible for an annuity benefit or equivalent lump-sum payment in addition to the original retirement allowance. A reemployed retiree may alternatively receive a refund of only member contributions with interest before age 65, once employment is terminated.

The DB and Combined Plan offer access to health coverage to eligible retirees who participated in the plans and their eligible dependents. Coverage under the current program includes hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs and partial reimbursement of monthly Medicare Part B premiums. By Ohio law, health care benefits are not guaranteed.

A DB or Combined Plan member with five or more years' credited service who becomes disabled may qualify for a disability benefit. Eligible spouses and dependents of members who die before retirement may qualify for survivor benefits. A death benefit of \$1,000 is payable to the beneficiary of each deceased retired member who participated in the DB Plan. Death benefit coverage up to \$2,000 can be purchased by participants in the DB, DC or Combined Plans. Various other benefits are available to members' beneficiaries.

Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code provides statutory authority for member and employer contributions. Contribution rates are established by the State Teachers Retirement Board, upon recommendation of its consulting actuary, not to exceed statutory maximum rates of 10% for members and 14% for employers. Contribution requirements and the contributions actually made for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011 (the latest year available), were 10% of covered payroll for members and 14% for employers. The amount required to fund pension obligations during the year is 13%.

PTCE's required contributions for pension obligations for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012, 2011 and 2010 were \$101,156, \$92,486 and \$82,110, respectively; 100% has been contributed for fiscal years 2012, 2011 and 2010. Member and employer contributions actually made for DB, DC and Combined Plan participants will be provided upon written request.

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**2. School Employees Retirement System**

PTCE contributes to the School Employees Retirement System of Ohio (SERS), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. SERS provides retirement, disability and survivor benefits; annual cost-of-living adjustments; and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Authority to establish and amend benefits is provided by state statute per Chapter 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code. SERS issues a publicly available, stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report can be obtained by contacting SERS, 300 E. Broad Street, Suite 100, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3746 or by calling toll free 1-800-878-5853. It is also posted on SERS' website at [www.ohsers.org](http://www.ohsers.org) under Employers/Audit Resources.

Plan members are required to contribute 10% of their annual covered salary and PTCE is required to contribute 14% of annual covered payroll. The contribution requirements of plan members and employers are established and may be amended, up to statutory maximum amounts, by the SERS' Retirement Board. The Retirement Board acting with the advice of the actuary, allocates the employer contribution rate among four of the funds (Pension Trust Fund, Death Benefit Fund, Medicare B Fund and Health Care Fund) of the System. For fiscal year ending June 30, 2011, the allocation to pension and death benefits is 11.81%. The remaining 2.19% of the 14% employer contribution rate is allocated to the Health Care and Medicare B Funds. PTCE's contributions to SERS for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012, 2011 and 2010 were \$11,780, \$10,939 and \$10,505, respectively; 100% has been contributed for fiscal years 2012, 2011 and 2010.

**X. Post-Employment Benefits Other than Pension Benefits**

**1. State Teachers Retirement System**

Ohio law authorizes STRS Ohio to offer a cost-sharing, multiple employer health care plans. STRS Ohio provides access to health care coverage to eligible retirees who participated in the Defined Benefit or Combined Plans. Coverage under the current program includes hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs and reimbursement of monthly Medicare Part B premiums.

Pursuant to Section 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code, the Retirement Board has discretionary authority over how much, if any, of the associated health care costs will be absorbed by STRS Ohio. All benefit recipients, for the most recent year, pay a portion of the health care costs in the form of a monthly premium.

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Under Ohio law funding for post-employment health care may be deducted from employer contributions. Of the 14% employer contribution rate, 1% of covered payroll was allocated to post-employment health care. The 14% employer contribution rate is the maximum rate established under Ohio law. For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012, 2011 and 2010 PTCE's contributions to post-employment health care were \$7,781, \$7,114 and \$6,316, respectively; 100% has been contributed for fiscal years 2012, 2011 and 2010.

**2. School Employees Retirement System**

In addition to a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan the School Employees Retirement System of Ohio administers two post-employment benefit plans. The Medicare B Plan reimburses Medicare Part B premiums paid by eligible retirees and beneficiaries as set forth in Ohio Revised Code 3309.69. Qualified benefit recipients who pay Medicare Part B premiums may apply for and receive a monthly reimbursement from SERS. The reimbursement amount is limited by statute to the lesser of the January 1, 1999 Medicare Part B premium or the current premium. The Medicare Part B premium for calendar year 2011 was \$96.40 for most participants, but could be as high as \$369.10 per month depending on their income. SERS' reimbursement to retirees was \$45.50.

The Retirement Board, acting with the advice of the actuary, allocates a portion of the current employer contribution rate to the Medicare Part B Fund. For fiscal year 2011 the actuarially required allocation is .76%. For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012, 2011 and 2010 PTCE contributions to Medicare Part B were \$639, \$594 and \$570, respectively; 100% has been contributed for fiscal years 2012, 2011 and 2010.

Ohio Revised Code 3309.375 and 3309.69 permit SERS to offer health care benefits to eligible retirees and beneficiaries. SERS' Retirement Board reserves the right to change or discontinue any health plan or program. SERS offers several types of health plans from various vendors, including HMOs, PPOs, Medicare Advantage and traditional indemnity plans. A prescription drug program is also available to those who elect health coverage. SERS employs two third-party administrators and a pharmacy benefit manager to manage the self-insurance and prescription drug plans, respectively. The Ohio Revised Code provides a statutory authority to fund SERS' postemployment benefits through employee contributions. Active members do not make contributions to the postemployment plans.

The Health Care Fund was established under, and is administered in accordance with Internal Revenue Code 105(e). Each year after the allocation for statutorily required benefits, the Retirement Board allocates the remainder of the employer 14% contribution to the Health Care Fund. For the year ended June 30, 2011 the health care allocation is 1.43%. An additional health care surcharge on employers is collected for

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employees earning less than an actuarially determined minimum compensation amount, pro-rated according to service credit earned. Statutes provide that no employer shall pay a health care surcharge greater than 2% of that employer's SERS covered payroll; nor may SERS collect in aggregate more than 1.5% of the total statewide SERS-covered payroll for the health care surcharge. For fiscal year 2012, the minimum compensation level was established at \$35,800. The surcharge, added to the unallocated portion of the 14% employer contribution rate is the total amount assigned to the Health Care Fund. For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012, 2011 and 2010 PTCE contributions to the Health Care Plan, including the surcharge were \$2,474, \$2,298 and \$1,498, respectively; 48.6% has been contributed for fiscal year 2012 and 100% for fiscal years 2011 and 2010. \$1,271 representing the unpaid surcharge due for fiscal year 2012 is recorded as a liability within the respective funds.

**XI. Contingencies**

**1. Grants**

PTCE received financial assistance from Federal and State agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs requires compliance with terms and conditions, specified in the grant agreements and are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of PTCE. However, in the opinion of management, any such disallowed claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of PTCE at June 30, 2012.

**2. Enrollment FTE**

The Ohio Department of Education conducts reviews of enrollment and full-time equivalency (FTE) calculations made by the schools. These reviews are conducted to ensure the schools are reporting accurate student enrollment data to the State, upon which state foundation funding is calculated. The conclusions of this review could result in state funding being adjusted. Adjustments to the state funding received during fiscal year 2012 are immaterial and are not reflected in the financial statements but will be included in the financial activity for fiscal year 2013.

**3. Student Attendance Data Review**

The Auditor of State is currently performing a statewide review of supporting documentation for student attendance data reported to the Ohio Department of Education. The results of this review are still pending and will be reported separately to the Ohio Department of education at a later date.

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PTCE received financial assistance from federal and State agencies in the form of grants. The expenditure of funds received under these programs generally requires compliance with terms and conditions specified in the grant agreements and are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of the General Fund or other applicable fund. This also encompasses the Auditor of State's ongoing review of student attendance data. The effect of any such disallowed claims on the overall financial position of the school as of June 30, 2012, if applicable, cannot be determined at this time.

**XII. Sponsorship and Management Agreements**

PTCE entered into an agreement with the ESC of Lake Erie West, (ESCLEW) formerly Lucas County Educational Service Center, to provide sponsorship and oversight services as required by law. The agreement was renewed at the end of the fiscal year and continues until June 30, 2022. Sponsorship fees are calculated as 1.5% of the Fiscal Year 2012 Foundation payments received by PTCE, from the State of Ohio. The total amount due from PTCE for fiscal year 2012 was \$22,228 all of which was paid prior to June 30, 2012.

PTCE entered into an agreement with Constellation Schools to provide legal, financial, and business management services for fiscal year 2012. The agreement was for a period of one year, effective July 1, 2011. Management fees are calculated as 6.25% of the Fiscal Year 2012 Foundation and State Fiscal Stabilization Funds payment received by PTCE from the State of Ohio plus a fixed fee of \$101,075. The total amount due from PTCE for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012 was \$193,994 all of which was paid prior to June 30, 2012.
