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INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON APPLYING AGREED-UPON PROCEDURES

We have performed the procedures enumerated below, with which the Board of Directors and the management of Fairfield County Agricultural Society (the "Society") and the Auditor of State agreed, solely to assist the Board in evaluating receipts, disbursements and balances recorded in their cash-basis accounting records for the years ended November 30, 2015 and 2014, and certain compliance requirements related to these transactions and balances. Management is responsible for recording transactions; and management and the Board are responsible for complying with the compliance requirements. This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants' attestation standards and applicable attestation engagement standards included in the Comptroller General of the United States' Government Auditing Standards. The sufficiency of the procedures is solely the responsibility of the parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

This report only describes exceptions exceeding \$10.

Cash and Investments

- 1. We tested the mathematical accuracy of the November 30, 2015 and November 30, 2014 bank reconciliations. We found no exceptions.
- 2. We agreed the December 1, 2013 beginning fund balances recorded to the November 30, 2013 balances in the prior year audited statements. We found no exceptions. We also agreed the December 1, 2014 beginning fund balances recorded to the November 30, 2014 balances. We found no exceptions.
- 3. We agreed the totals per the bank reconciliations to the total of the November 30, 2015 and 2014 fund cash balance reported in the General Ledger. The amounts agreed.
- 4. We confirmed the November 30, 2015 bank account balances with the Society's financial institutions. We found no exceptions. We also agreed the confirmed balances to the amounts appearing in the November 30, 2015 bank reconciliation. The confirmed amounts were \$1,757.10 greater than the amounts recorded on the bank reconciliation (the Society's ledger) due to unrecorded interest.
- 5. We selected five reconciling debits (such as outstanding checks) haphazardly from the November 30, 2015 bank reconciliation:
 - a. We traced each debit to the subsequent December bank statement. We found no exceptions.

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- b. We traced the amounts and dates to the check register, to determine the debits were dated prior to November 30. We noted no exceptions.
- 6. We tested investments held at November 30, 2015 and November 30, 2014 to determine that they:
 - a. Were of a type authorized by Ohio Rev. Code Sections 135.13, 135.14 or 135.144. We found no exceptions.
 - b. Mature within the prescribed time limits noted in Ohio Rev. Code Section 135.13 or 135.14. We noted no exceptions.

Intergovernmental Receipts

We selected all the receipts from the Distribution Transaction Detail Report (State DTL) for 2015 and 2014. We also selected the single receipt from the Fairfield County Vendor Invoice List from 2015 and the single receipt from 2014.

- a. We compared the amount from the above reports to the amount recorded in the Deposit Detail Report. The amounts agreed.
- b. We determined whether these receipts were allocated to the proper account codes. We found no exceptions.
- c. We determined whether the receipts were recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.

Admission/Grandstand Receipts

We haphazardly selected one day of admission/grandstand cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2015 and one day of admission/grandstand cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2014 recorded in the Deposit Detail Report and determined whether the receipt amount agreed to the supporting documentation (ticket recapitulation sheets/cash register tapes, etc). The amounts agreed.

Privilege Fee Receipts

We haphazardly selected 10 privilege fee cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2015 and 10 privilege fee cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2014 recorded in the duplicate cash receipts book and determined whether the:

- a. Receipt amount agreed to the amount recorded in the Deposit Detail Report. The amounts agreed.
- b. Amount charged complied with rates in force during the period. We found no exceptions.
- c. Receipt was recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.

Rental Receipts

We haphazardly selected 10 rental cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2015 and 10 rental cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2014 recorded in the duplicate cash receipts book and determined whether the:

- a. Receipt amount agreed to the amount recorded in the Deposit Detail Report. The amounts agreed.
- b. Amount charged complied with rates in force during the period. We found no exceptions.
- c. Receipt was recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.

Over-The-Counter Cash Receipts

We haphazardly selected 10 over-the-counter cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2015 and 10 over-the-counter cash receipts from the year ended 2014 recorded in the duplicate cash receipts book and determined whether the:

- a. Receipt amount agreed to the amount recorded in the Deposit Detail Report. The amounts agreed.
- b. Amount charged complied with rates in force during the period. We found no exceptions.

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c. Receipt was posted to the proper funds, and was recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.

Debt

- 1. The prior audit documentation disclosed no debt outstanding as of November 30, 2013.
- 2. We inquired of management, and scanned the receipt and expenditure records for evidence of loan or credit agreements, and bonded, note, County, or mortgage debt issued during 2015 or 2014 or debt payment activity during 2015 or 2014. We noted no new debt issuances, nor any debt payment activity during 2015 or 2014.

Payroll Cash Disbursements

- 1. We haphazardly selected one payroll check for five employees from 2015 and one payroll check for five employees from 2014 from the Payroll Register and:
 - a. We compared the hours and pay rate, or salary recorded in the Payroll Register to supporting documentation (timecard, legislatively or statutorily-approved rate or salary). We found no exceptions.
- 2. We scanned the last remittance of tax and retirement withholdings for the year ended November 30, 2015 to determine whether remittances were timely paid, and that the amounts paid agreed to the amounts withheld, plus the employer's share where applicable, during the final withholding period of 2015. We noted the following:

Non-Payroll Cash Disbursements

We haphazardly selected ten disbursements from the General Ledger for the year ended November 30, 2015 and ten from the year ended 2014 and determined whether:

- a. The disbursements were for a proper public purpose. We found no exceptions.
- b. The check number, date, payee name and amount recorded on the returned, canceled check agreed to the check number, date, payee name and amount recorded in the General Ledger and to the names and amounts on the supporting invoices. We found no exceptions.
- c. Based on the nature of the expenditure, the account coding is reasonable. We found no exceptions.
