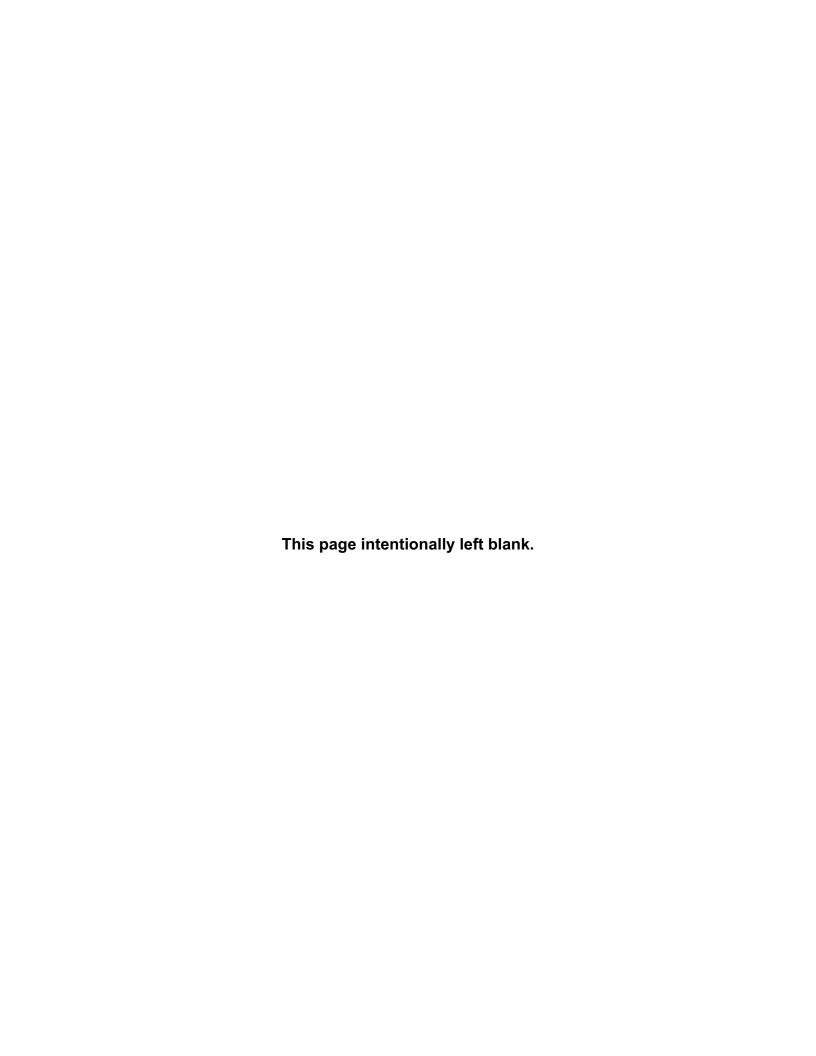

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

Greater Cleveland Academy for Gifted Students Cuyahoga County 3200 West 65th Street Cleveland, Ohio 44102

To the Board of Trustees:

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of the Greater Cleveland Academy for Gifted Students, Cuyahoga County, Ohio, (the Academy) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which collectively comprise the Academy's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Academy's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to reasonably assure whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Greater Cleveland Academy for Gifted Students, Cuyahoga County, Ohio, as of June 30, 2006 and the changes in financial position and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 22, 2007, on our consideration of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. While we did not opine on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance, that report describes the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. You should read it in conjunction with this report in assessing the results of our audit.

Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2006 Unaudited

The discussion and analysis of Greater Cleveland Academy for Gifted Students' financial performance provides an overall review of the School's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the School's financial performance as a whole. Readers should also review the Notes to the Financial Statements and the Financial Statements to enhance their understanding of the School's financial performance.

Financial Highlights

Key financial highlights for 2006 include the following:

- Enrollment increased from 27 students in the 2005 fiscal year (the initial year of operations) to 59 students for the 2006 fiscal year. The increase in enrollment improved the financial position for the school during the year.
- Net assets decreased \$24,905, which represents a 24.3% decrease from 2005. This
 decrease is due primarily enrollment increases which were below budgeted levels,
 resulting in higher operating costs per student.
- Total assets decreased \$8,003, which represents a 7.4% decrease from 2005. This decrease is due to a decrease in net capital assets of \$18,158 which is partially offset by increases in cash of \$6,681 and other current assets of \$3,474.
- Liabilities increased \$16,902, which represents a 273.1% increase from 2005. Accounts payable increased by \$18,942 and other current liabilities decreased by \$2,040.
- Operating revenues increased by \$82,297, which represents a 29.2% increase from 2005. The increase is due to increased enrollment resulting in increased state funding and materials fees offset by revenues from Constellation Community Schools to subsidize the first year of operations.
- Operating expenses increased by \$60,926, which represents a 12.4% increase from 2005. Operating expense increases due to additional staffing, additional services delivered for the increased enrollment, annual increases in service costs and additional services paid with non-operating revenues were offset by reductions in materials, supplies and equipment which were purchased in the first year of operations.
- Non-operating revenues decreased by \$121,728, which represents a 42.7% decrease from 2005. This decrease is due mostly to decrease in Federal Start-Up grants.

Using this Financial Report

This report consists of three parts, the Management's Discussion and Analysis, the Financial Statements and the Notes to the Financial Statements. The Financial Statements include a Statement of Net Assets, a Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets and a Statement of Cash Flows.

Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2006 Unaudited

Statement of Net Assets

The Statement of Net Assets looks at how well the school has performed financially from inception through June 30, 2006. This statement includes all of the assets, liabilities and net assets using the accrual basis of accounting, which is the accounting method used by most private-sector companies. This basis of accounting takes into account all revenues earned and expenses incurred during the year, regardless as to when the cash is received or expended.

The following schedule provides a summary of the School's Statement of Net Assets for fiscal years ended June 30, 2006 and 2005.

Net Assets decreased \$24,905, due primarily enrollment increases which were less than budgeted, resulting in higher than anticipated per pupil costs. For assets, cash increased \$6,681; due from other governments increased \$10,832; accounts receivable decreased \$7,358, and net capital assets decreased \$18,158 from 2005. For liabilities, accounts payable increased \$18,942; due to other governments increased \$751 and deferred revenues decreased \$2,791 from 2005.

Net Assets decreased for fiscal year 2006 and increased for fiscal year 2005, for a combined net increase. This combined increased is due primarily to increasing revenues from increasing enrollment. Although certain expenditures such as salaries will increase as the number of classes increases other costs remain fixed such as facilities costs resulting in more efficient operations. Additionally, grants have been received to supplement various educational programs and purchase educational equipment.

Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2006 Unaudited

The most significant increases in revenues from 2005 to 2006 are Foundation and Poverty Based Assistance funds (increased \$182,523) due to enrollment increases and increases in formula amounts. Federal and State Grants decreased \$121,796 due mainly to receiving more Federal Start-Up grant funds in 2005. Additionally, Private Grants and Contributions increased \$68.

Most areas of expenses increased from 2005 to 2006. Salaries and Fringe Benefits increased \$104,132 due to additional staffing and annual increases. Purchased services increased \$48,571 due to additional instructional services, pupil support services, administrative services and occupancy costs. Materials and Supplies decreased \$74,431 and Capital Outlay decreased \$19,079 due to using text books, classroom supplies and classroom equipment purchased with grant funds in fiscal year 2005. Depreciation increased \$890 as a result of having a full year of depreciation for computers, equipment and furniture placed in service during the 2005 fiscal year and from additional computers, equipment and furniture purchased during the year. Other Operating Expenses increased \$843 due to increased miscellaneous expenses and insurance premiums.

Capital Assets

As of June 30, 2006 the School had \$62,045 invested in leasehold improvements, computers, office equipment, furniture, classroom equipment and materials, net of depreciation. This is an \$18,158 decrease over June 30, 2005.

Current Financial Issues

Greater Cleveland Academy for Gifted Students opened in the fall of 2005. In its second year of operation it has grown from 27 students, two teaching staff members and expenses of \$491,911 (includes start-up expenditures) to a total of 59 students, five teaching staff members and expenses of \$552,837. Despite attempts to increase enrollment for the 2006-2007 school year we experienced a decline in the number of students committed to return and were unsuccessful in recruiting new students. In order to properly and efficiently operate the school on a financial basis at least 100 students were needed for the 2006-2007 school year. As a result of the disappointing decline in enrollment, the school has ceased operations effective the end of the 2005-2006 school year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2006

I. Description of the School and Reporting Entity

Greater Cleveland Academy for Gifted students (GCAGS) is a nonprofit corporation established on December 5, 2003 pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 3314 and 1702 to maintain and provide a school exclusively for any educational, literary, scientific and related teaching service that qualifies as an exempt organization under §501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. On February 10, 2005, GCAGS applied for tax-exempt status with the Internal Revenue Service under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code which is currently under review. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect GCAGS' tax-exempt status. GCAGS, which is part of Ohio's education program, is independent of any school district. GCAGS may sue and be sued, acquire facilities as needed, and contract for any services necessary for the operation of GCAGS.

On January 20, 2004 GCAGS was approved for operation under a contract between the Governing Authority of GCAGS and Lucas County Educational Service Center (LCESC) as their sponsor. Under the terms of the contract LCESC will provide sponsorship services for a fee. The Sponsor is responsible for evaluating the performance of the school and has the authority to deny renewal of the contract at its expiration or terminate the contract prior to expiration. See Note XII for further discussion of the sponsor services. The Governing Authority formed an Ohio non-profit corporation, on September 17, 1999 under the name Constellation Community Schools (management company).

GCAGS operates under a five-member Board of Trustees. The Board is responsible for carrying out the provisions of the contract, which include, but are not limited to, state-mandated provisions regarding student population, curriculum, academic goals, performance standards, admission standards, and qualification of teachers. GCAGS controls one instructional facility staffed by five certificated full time teaching personnel who provide services to 59 students.

GCAGS entered into an agreement with CCS to provide management services for the fiscal year. See footnote XII for additional information regarding the management company. The board members of GCAGS were also board members of CCS until June 15, 2006 at which time a separate CCS Board was formed. GCAGS Board members are also Board members of Old Brooklyn Community School, Parma Community School, Elyria Community School, Lorain Community School, Westpark Community School, Mansfield Community School, Puritas Community School, Madison Community School, Stockyard Community School, Lorain Academy for Gifted Students, Lorain Community Middle School, Old Brooklyn Community Middle School, Westpark Community Middle School and Outreach Academy for Children with Disabilities.

II. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of GCAGS have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles as applied to governmental nonprofit organizations. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. GCAGS also applies Financial Accounting Standards Board statements and interpretations issued on or before November 30, 1989, provided they do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant of GCAGS' accounting policies are described below.

1. Basis of Presentation

Enterprise accounting is used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges or where it has been decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability or other purposes.

2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The accounting and financial reporting treatment is determined by its measurement focus. Enterprise accounting uses a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities are included on the Statement of Net Assets. Operating statements present increases (e.g., revenues) and decreases (e.g., expenses) in net total assets.

Basis of accounting determines when transactions are recorded in the financial records and reported on the financial statements. GCAGS prepares financial statements using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded when the exchange takes place. Revenues resulting from non-exchange transactions, in which GCAGS receives value without directly giving equal value in return, such as grants and entitlements, are recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the fiscal year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when the use is first permitted; matching requirements, in which GCAGS must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose; and expenditure requirements, in which resources are provided to GCAGS on a reimbursement basis. Expenses are recognized at the time they are incurred.

2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting (Continued)

For fiscal year 2006, GCAGS has implemented GASB Statement No. 42, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Impairment of Capital Assets for Insurance Recoveries," GASB Statement No. 44, "Economic Condition Reporting: The Statistical Section," and GASB Statement No. 47, "Accounting for Termination Benefits."

GASB Statement No. 42 establishes accounting and financial reporting standards for impairment of capital assets and clarifies and establishes accounting requirements for insurance recoveries.

GASB Statement No. 44 is to improve the understandability and usefulness of the information that State and local governments present as supplementary information in the statistical section.

GASB Statement No. 47 establishes standards of accounting and financial reporting for termination benefits.

3. Cash

All monies received by GCAGS are deposited in demand deposit accounts.

4. Budgetary Process

Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapter 5705.391 GCAGS prepares and adopts an annual budget which includes estimated revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year and a five year forecast of revenues and expenditures. GCAGS will from time to time adopt budget revisions as necessary.

5. Due from Other Governments and Accounts Receivable

Moneys due GCAGS for the year ended June 30, 2006 are recorded as Due from Other Governments and as Accounts Receivable. A current asset for the receivable amount is recorded at the time of the event causing the moneys to be due.

6. Capital Assets and Depreciation

Capital assets are capitalized at cost and updated for additions and retirements during the year. Donated capital assets are recorded at their fair market values as of the dates received. All items with a useful life of one year or greater and a value of \$500 or more are capitalized. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized.

Leasehold improvements are also capitalized. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized.

Depreciation of leasehold improvements, computers, furniture, equipment and materials is computed using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives. Improvements to capital assets are depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related capital assets. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

7. Intergovernmental Revenues

GCAGS currently participates in the State Foundation Program and the State Poverty Based Assistance Program. Revenues received from these programs are recognized as operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met.

Grants and entitlements are recognized as non-operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met.

GCAGS also participates in the Federal Charter School Grant Program through the Ohio Department of Education. Under this program, GCAGS was awarded \$150,000 in fiscal year 2006 to offset start-up costs of the School. During fiscal year 2006, \$137,354 from the 2006 award was received with the balance of \$12,646 recorded as Due from Other Governments. Revenue received from this program is recognized as non-operating revenue on the accompanying financial statements.

Amounts awarded under the above named programs for the 2006 school year totaled \$513,877.

8. Compensated Absences

Vacation is taken in a manner which corresponds with the school calendar, therefore, GCAGS does not accrue vacation time as a liability.

Sick leave benefits are earned at the rate of one and one-quarter day per month and can be accrued up to a maximum amount of one hundred twenty days. GCAGS will accept the transfer of sick days from another school district up to the maximum accrual amount. No financial accrual for sick time is made since unused sick time is not paid to employees upon employment termination.

9. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

10. Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue arises when assets are recognized before revenue recognition criteria have been satisfied. The deferred revenue for GCAGS consists of material and fees received in the current year which pertain to the next school year.

III. Deposits

At fiscal year end June 30, 2006, the carrying amount of GCAGS' deposits totaled \$17,126 and its bank balance was \$23,815. Based on the criteria described in GASB Statement No. 40, "Deposit and Investment Risk Disclosure," as of June 30, 2006, none of the bank balance was exposed to custodial risk as discussed below, while all of the bank balance was covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of bank failure, GCAGS will not be able to recover the deposits. All deposits are collateralized with eligible securities in amounts equal to at least 105% of the carrying value of the deposits. Such collateral, as permitted by the Ohio Revised Code, is held in single financial institution collateral pools at the Federal Reserve Banks or at member banks of the federal reserve system, in the name of the respective depository bank and pledged as a pool of collateral against all of the public deposits it holds or as specific collateral held at the Federal Reserve Bank in the name of GCAGS.

VI. Operating Leases

GCAGS leases its facilities at 3200 West 65th Street, Cleveland from Richard and Lisa Lukich (see Note XIII – Related Parties) under a five-year lease agreement effective July 1, 2004 and expiring June 30, 2009. Monthly payments under the terms of the lease are \$5,000. The lease also provides that GCAGS will pay \$75,000 for build-out and improvements to the building. GCAGS has an option to purchase the building at a price to be set by appraisal should GCAGS exercise their option.

During fiscal year 2006 rents totaled \$60,000. Leasehold Improvements totaling \$75,000 were paid in 2005 to J&O Construction during the build-out of the leased space.

VII. Risk Management

1. Property and Liability Insurance

GCAGS is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. For fiscal year 2006, GCAGS contracted with Cincinnati Insurance Company for all of its' insurance.

General liability is covered at \$2,000,000 single occurrence limit and \$4,000,000 aggregated. Hired and Non-Owned Vehicles are covered at \$500,000 combined single limit of liability. Other coverage includes School Leaders Errors & Omissions, Employee Crime, Sexual Abuse and Misconduct, Electronic Data Processing and Business Interruption.

2. Workers' Compensation

GCAGS makes premium payments to the Ohio Worker's Compensation System for employee injury coverage. As of June 30, 2006 there have been no claims filed by GCAGS employees with the Ohio Worker's Compensation System.

3. Employee Medical, Dental, and Vision Benefits

GCAGS provides medical, dental and life insurance benefits to all full time employees. Employees participate in premium payments through pretax payroll deductions. For the fiscal year the cost to GCAGS for insurance benefits was \$25,279.

VIII. Defined Benefit Pension Plans

1. School Employees Retirement System

GCAGS contributes to the School Employees Retirement System of Ohio (SERS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. SERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Authority to establish and amend benefits is provided by state statute per Chapter 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code. SERS issues a publicly available, stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to the School Employees Retirement System, 300 East Broad St., Suite 100, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3746 by calling (800)878-5853 of by visiting the SERS website at ohsers.org.

Plan members are required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salary and GCAGS is required to contribute an actuarially determined rate. The current rate for GCAGS is 14 percent of annual covered payroll. A portion of GCAGS' contribution is used to fund pension obligations with the remainder being used to fund health care benefits; for fiscal year 2006, 10.58 percent of annual covered salary was the portion to fund pension obligations. The contribution requirements of plan members and employers are established and may be amended, up to a statutory maximum amount, by the SERS' Retirement Board. GCAGS' required contribution for pension obligations to SERS for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 was \$1,390. For fiscal year 2006, all required contributions have been made.

2. State Teachers Retirement System

GCAGS participates in the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio), a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system. STRS Ohio provides retirement and disability benefits to members and death and survivor benefits to beneficiaries. STRS Ohio issues a stand-alone financial report that may be obtained by writing to STRS Ohio, 275 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3771, by calling (614)227-4090, or by visiting the STRS Ohio web site at www.strsoh.org.

New members have a choice of three retirement plans, a Defined Benefit (DB) Plan, a Defined Contribution (DC) Plan and a Combined Plan. The DB plan offers an annual retirement allowance based on final average salary times a percentage that varies based on years of service, or an allowance based on member contributions and earned interest matched by STRS Ohio funds divided by an actuarially determined annuity factor. The DC Plan allows members to place all their member contributions and employer contributions equal to 10.5 percent of earned compensation into an investment account. Investment decisions are made by the member.

VIII. Defined Benefit Pension Plans (Continued)

2. State Teachers Retirement System (Continued)

A member is eligible to receive a retirement benefit at age 50 and termination of employment. The Combined Plan offers features of both the DC and the DB Plan. In the Combined Plan, member contributions are invested by the member, and employer contributions are used to fund the defined benefit payment at a reduced level from the regular DB Plan. DC and Combined Plan members will transfer to the Defined Benefit Plan during the fifth year of membership unless they permanently select the DC or Combined Plan. Existing members with less than five years of service credit as of June 30, 2001, were given the option of making a one time irrevocable decision to transfer their account balances from the existing DB Plan into the DC or the Combined Plan. This option expired on December 31, 2001. Benefits are established by Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code.

A DB or Combined Plan member with five or more years credited service who becomes disabled may qualify for a disability benefit. Eligible spouses and dependents of these active members who die before retirement may qualify for survivor benefits. Members in the DC Plan who become disabled are entitled only to their account balance. If a member dies before retirement benefits begin, the member's designated beneficiary is entitled to receive the member's account balance.

For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, plan members were required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salary. GCAGS was required to contribute 14 percent, 13 percent was the portion used to fund pension obligation. For fiscal year 2005, the portion used to fund pension obligations was also 13 percent. Contribution rates are established by the State Teachers Retirement Board, upon recommendations of its consulting actuary, not to exceed statutory maximum rates of 10 percent for members and 14 percent for employers. Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code provides statutory authority for member and employer contributions.

GCAGS' required contribution for pension obligations to STRS Ohio for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2006 and 2005 were \$24,014 and \$15,848. For fiscal year 2006, GCAGS all required contributions have been made.

IX. Post-Employment Benefits

GCAGS provides comprehensive health care benefits to retired teachers and their dependents through the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio) and to retired non-certified employees and their dependents through the School Employees Retirement System (SERS). Benefits include hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs and partial reimbursement of monthly Medicare premiums. Benefit provisions and the obligations to contribute are established by the Systems based on authority granted by State statute. Both systems are on a pay-as-you-go basis.

All STRS Ohio retirees who participated in the DB or Combined Plans and their dependents are eligible for health care coverage. The STRS Ohio Board has statutory authority over how much, if any, of the health care costs will be absorbed by STRS Ohio. All benefit recipients pay a portion of the health care cost in the form of a monthly premium. By law, the cost of coverage paid from STRS Ohio funds is included in the employer contribution rate, currently 14 percent of covered payroll. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, the STRS Ohio Board allocated employer contributions equal to one percent of covered payroll to the Health Care Stabilization Fund. For GCAGS, this amount equaled \$1,979 during fiscal 2006.

STRS Ohio pays health care benefits from the Health Care Reserve Fund. At June 30, 2005, (the latest information available) the balance in the Fund was \$3.3 billion. For the year ended June 30, 2005, net health care costs paid by STRS were \$254,780,000 and STRS had 115,395 eligible benefit recipients.

For SERS, coverage is made available to service retirees with ten or more years of qualifying service credit, and to disability and survivor benefit recipients. All retirees and beneficiaries are required to pay a portion of their premiums for health care. The portion is based on years of service, Medicare eligibility and retirement status.

After the allocation for the basic benefits, the remainder of the employer's 14 percent contribution is allocated to providing health care benefits. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, employer contributions to fund health care benefits were 3.42 percent of covered payroll, compared to 3.43 percent of covered payroll for fiscal year 2005. In addition, SERS levies a surcharge to fund health care benefits equal to 14 percent of the difference between a minimum pay and the member's pay, pro-rated for partial service credit. For fiscal year 2006, the minimum pay was established at \$35,800. However, the surcharge is capped at 2 percent of each employer's SERS salaries. For GCAGS, the amount contributed to fund health care benefits, including surcharge, during the 2006 fiscal year equaled \$647.

IX. Post-Employment Benefits (Continued)

The surcharge added to the unallocated portion of the 14 percent employer contribution rate, provides for maintenance of the asset target level of the health care fund. The target level of the health care reserve is 150 percent of the projected claims less premium contributions for the next fiscal year. Expenses for health care for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2005 (the latest information available), were \$178,221,113. At June 30, 2005, SERS had net assets available for health care benefits of \$267.5 million. SERS has 58,123 participants eligible to receive health care benefits.

X. State School Funding Decision

On December 11, 2002, the Ohio Supreme Court issued its latest opinion regarding the State's school funding plan. The decision reaffirmed earlier decisions that Ohio's current school-funding plan is unconstitutional.

The Supreme Court relinquished jurisdiction over the case and directed "...the Ohio General Assembly to enact a school-funding scheme that is thorough and efficient...".

GCAGS is currently unable to determine what effect, if any, this decision will have on its future State funding and its financial operations.

XI. Contingencies

1. Grants

GCAGS received financial assistance from Federal and State agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs requires compliance with terms and conditions, specified in the grant agreements and are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of GCAGS. However, in the opinion of management, any such disallowed claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of GCAGS at June 30, 2006.

2. Litigation

A suit was filed in the US District Court, Southern District of Ohio, Western Division on October 6, 2004, which challenges the funding of charter schools under Equal Protection, Due Process and claims violation of a right to vote on the bodies administering public schools. The case is still pending. The effect of this suit, if any, on GCAGS is not presently determinable.

3. Enrollment FTE

The Ohio Department of Education conducts reviews of enrollment and full-time equivalency (FTE) calculations made by the schools. These reviews are conducted to ensure the schools are reporting accurate student enrollment data to the State, upon which state foundation funding is calculated. The conclusions of this review could result in state funding being adjusted. As of the date of this report adjustments to the state funding received during fiscal year 2006 are reflected in the financial statements.

XII. Sponsorship and Management Agreement

GCAGS entered into an agreement with Lucas County Educational Service Center (LCESC) to provide sponsorship and oversight services as required by law. The agreement is effective October 16, 2003. Sponsorship fees are calculated as 1% of state funds received by GCAGS, from the State of Ohio. The total amount due from GCAGS for fiscal year 2006 was \$3,511of which \$303 was outstanding as of June 30, 2006.

GCAGS entered into an agreement with Constellation Community Schools (CCS) to provide legal, financial, and business management services for the fiscal year 2006. The agreement was for a period of one year, effective July 1, 2005. Management fees are calculated as 11% of the Fiscal Year 2006 Foundation payment received by GCAGS, as reported in the Monthly Community School Foundation Report. The total amount due from GCAGS for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006 was \$38,542 of which \$6,602 was outstanding as of June 30, 2006 and is included in accounts payable.

In addition GCAGS is participating in a payroll bonus reserve established through CCS. Payroll bonus reserve fees are calculated as 1% of the Fiscal Year 2006 Foundation payment received by GCAGS, as reported in the Monthly Community School Foundation Report. The total amount due from GCAGS for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006 was \$3,504 of which \$3,504 was outstanding as of June 30, 2006 and is included in accounts payable.

XIII. Related Parties

GCAGS leases its facilities at 3200 West 65th Street, Cleveland from Richard and Lisa Lukich (see Note VI – Operating Leases). The building was purchased by Richard and Lisa Lukich (Richard Lukich is President of the Board of Trustees) as an accommodation to the school which was unable to purchase the building as a start-up business. The monthly rent amount was set by a fair market appraisal of rents in which the area the school is located.

XIII. Related Parties (Continued)

The members of the GCAGS Board of Trustees were also members of Constellation Community Schools until June 15, 2006 at which time a separate CCS Board was formed. GCAGS contracts with CCS for legal, financial and business management services.

GCAGS Board members are also Board members of Old Brooklyn Community School, Parma Community School, Elyria Community School, Lorain Community School, Westpark Community School, Mansfield Community School, Puritas Community School, Madison Community School, Stockyard Community School, Lorain Academy for Gifted Students, Lorain Community Middle School, Old Brooklyn Community Middle School, Westpark Community Middle School and Outreach Academy for Children with Disabilities.

XIV. Subsequent Events

GCAGS has ceased operating effective July 1, 2006. The Board of Trustees voted to formally close the school at the November 2006 Board meeting.

To the Board of Trustees:

We have audited the basic financial statements of the Greater Cleveland Academy for Gifted Students, Cuyahoga County, Ohio, (the Academy) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which collectively comprise the Academy's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated March 22, 2007. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Academy's internal control over financial reporting to determine our auditing procedures in order to express our opinion on the financial statements and not to opine on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts material to the financial statements we audited may occur and not be timely detected by employees when performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider material weaknesses. In a separate letter to the Academy's management dated March 22, 2007, we reported other matters involving internal control over financial reporting we did not deem reportable conditions.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of reasonably assuring whether the Academy's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we tested its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could directly and materially affect the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters we must report under *Government Auditing Standards*. In a separate letter to the Academy's management dated March 22, 2007, we reported another matter related to noncompliance we deemed immaterial.
