

#### INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

To the Board of Trustees:

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of Parma Community School, Cuyahoga County, Ohio, (the School) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the School's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to reasonably assure whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Parma Community School, Cuyahoga County, Ohio, as of June 30, 2007, and the changes in financial position and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated February 7, 2008, on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. While we did not opine on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance, that report describes the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. You should read it in conjunction with this report in assessing the results of our audit.

Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Year Ended June 30, 2007 Unaudited

The discussion and analysis of Parma Community School's (PCS) financial performance provides an overall review of financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the financial performance of PCS as a whole. Readers should also review the Notes to the Financial Statements and the Financial Statements to enhance their understanding of the financial performance of PCS.

#### **Financial Highlights**

Key financial highlights for 2007 include the following:

- In total, net assets increased \$212,270, which represents a 76.4% increase from 2006. This increase is due primarily to increased enrollment resulting in increased state funding and federal subsidies.
- Total assets increased \$132,731, which represents a 9.7% increase from 2006. This is due to an increase in cash of \$96,093, an increase in other current assets of \$63,877 (mostly a real estate tax refund) and a decrease in net capital assets of \$27,239. The cash balance increase is due to increased operating efficiencies provided by the growth of the school offset by depreciation in excess of capital purchases.
- Liabilities decreased \$79,539, which represents a 7.3% decrease from 2006. Mortgages payable decreased by \$82,840 and current liabilities increased by a total of \$3,301.
- Operating revenues increased by \$440,705, which represents a 23.3% increase from 2006. This is a direct result of increasing enrollment which accounts for \$254,966 of the increase. The remaining \$185,739 is from financing of capital equipment and a refund of real estate taxes paid in prior years.
- Expenses increased by \$309,516, which represents a 15.6% increase from 2006. Operating expense increases are due to services provided for the increased enrollment, annual increases in service costs and additional services paid with non-operating revenues.
- Non-operating revenues increased by \$32,321, which represents a 21.6% increase from 2006. This increase is due mostly to increased Federal and State Grants in the amount of \$27,126 as well as increases in interest earned and private grants.

#### **Using this Financial Report**

This report consists of three parts, Management's Discussion and Analysis, the Financial Statements and the Notes to the Financial Statements. The Financial Statements include a Statement of Net Assets, a Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets and a Statement of Cash Flows.

#### **Statement of Net Assets**

The Statement of Net Assets looks at how well PCS has performed financially through June 30, 2007. This statement includes all of the assets, liabilities and net assets using the accrual basis of accounting, which is the accounting method used by most private-sector companies. This basis of accounting takes into account all revenues earned and expenses incurred during the year, regardless as to when the cash is received or expended.

Net Assets increased \$212,270, due primarily to increased enrollment and efficiencies in operating the school. For assets, cash increased \$96,093; due from other governments increased \$74,027 (real estate tax refund of \$67,237); accounts receivable decreased \$10,320, prepaid employee withholding increased \$170 and net capital assets decreased \$27,239 from 2006. For liabilities, accounts payable increased \$1,526; due to other governments decreased \$7,235; accrued wages and benefits decreased \$4,137; interest payable decreased \$354; deferred revenues increased \$13,501 and mortgage notes payable decreased \$82,840 from 2006.

Net Assets increased in both fiscal years ending June 30, 2006 and 2007. This is due primarily to increasing revenues from increasing enrollment. Although certain expenditures such as salaries will increase as the number of classes increases other costs remain fixed such as facilities costs resulting in more efficient operations. Additionally, grants have been received to supplement various educational programs and purchase educational equipment.

Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Year Ended June 30, 2007 Unaudited

The most significant increases in revenues from 2006 to 2007 are Foundation and Poverty Based Assistance funds which increased \$254,966 due to enrollment increases and increases in formula amounts. Federal and State Grants increased \$27,126 due mainly to increased title allocations. A refund of real estate taxes and financing of capital equipment, as well as increases in interest income, miscellaneous income and private grants account for the remaining increases.

Most categories of expense increased from 2006 to 2007. Salaries and Fringe Benefits increased \$90,628 due to additional staffing and annual increases. Purchased Services increased \$155,999 due to additional pupil support services, administrative services and occupancy costs. Materials and Supplies increased \$34,780 and Capital Outlay increased \$57,394 due to purchasing text books, classroom supplies, and furniture and equipment for added classrooms. Depreciation increased \$6,735 as a direct result of additional purchases of furniture and equipment and additional building improvements. Other Operating Expenses decreased \$36,021 due to reductions in mortgage debt service, insurance premiums and property taxes.

#### **Capital Assets**

As of June 30, 2007, PCS had \$1,240,305 invested in computers and office equipment, furniture and equipment, land, building and mortgage loan fees, and building improvements, net of depreciation. This is a \$27,239 decrease over June 30, 2006.

#### **Debt Service**

On November 28, 2003 PCS purchased the land and building in which it operates. Financing of the purchase was accomplished through two mortgages. The first mortgage is held by US Bank National Association with a face value of \$900,000 for a term of fifteen years and an interest rate of 6.49% per annum. This mortgage is guaranteed by the Ohio School Facilities Commission for an amount up to \$765,000. The second mortgage is held by Thomas J. Coury, Trustee with a face value of \$300,000 for a term of seven years and an interest rate of 8.00% per annum. The outstanding principal balances as of June 30, 2006 are \$764,604 and \$170,796 respectively.

#### **Current Financial Issues**

PCS opened in the fall of 2000. In its seventh year of operations it has grown from 37 students, six teaching staff members and expenses of \$380,240 to a total of 356 students, 31 teaching staff members and expenses of \$2,299,363. During this time we have purchased our own educational facility and, in the next year, will be acquiring another building to expand into high school grades and to increase the number of classes we currently offer. As PCS continues to grow and mature we strive to maintain the high level of services we currently offer, to provide a strong educational product to our students and families and to maintain the reputation we have developed during these initial years.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2007

#### I. Description of the School and Reporting Entity

Parma Community School (PCS) is a nonprofit corporation established March 14, 2000 pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 3314 and 1702 to maintain and provide a school exclusively for any educational, literary, scientific and related teaching service that qualifies as an exempt organization under § 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. On September 19, 2001, PCS received a determination letter confirming tax-exempt status with the Internal Revenue Service under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect PCS' tax-exempt status. PCS, which is part of Ohio's education program, is independent of any school district. PCS may sue and be sued, acquire facilities as needed, and contract for any services necessary for the operation of PCS.

PCS was approved for operation under a contract between the Governing Authority of Parma Community School and the Ohio Department of Education (the Sponsor) for a period of five years commencing July 1, 2000 and terminating on June 30, 2005. On October 16, 2003 PCS entered into a contract with Lucas County Educational Service Center (LCESC) to have LCESC replace the Ohio Department of Education as their sponsor. The contract with LCESC was subsequently renewed effective November 2, 2006. Under the terms of the contract LCESC will provide sponsorship services for a fee. See Note XII for further discussion of the sponsor services. PCS entered into an agreement with Constellation Schools (CS) to provide management services for the fiscal year. See Note XII for further discussion of this management agreement.

PCS operates under a five-member Board of Directors. The Board is responsible for carrying out the provisions of the contract, which include, but are not limited to, state-mandated provisions regarding student population, curriculum, academic goals, performance standards, admission standards, and qualification of teachers. The Board of Directors controls PCS' instructional facility staffed by thirty-one certificated full time teaching personnel who provide services to 356 students.

Beginning on February 16, 2007, the board members for PCS also serve as the board for Madison Community School. Previous to February 16, 2007 the board members of PCS were also board members of Old Brooklyn Community School, Elyria Community School, Lorain Community School, Westpark Community School, Mansfield Community School, Puritas Community School, Madison Community School, Stockyard Community School, Lorain Academy for Gifted Students, Lorain Community Middle School, Old Brooklyn Community Middle School, Westpark Community Middle School, Outreach Academy for Children with Disabilities and Puritas Community Middle School.

On March 27, 2007 PCS changed its legal name to Constellation Schools: Parma Community, but continues to operate as Parma Community School.

#### II. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of PCS have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles as applied to governmental nonprofit organizations. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. PCS also applies Financial Accounting Standards Board statements and interpretations issued on or before November 30, 1989, provided they do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant of PCS' accounting policies are described below.

#### 1. Basis of Presentation

Enterprise accounting is used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges or where it has been decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability or other purposes.

#### 2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The accounting and financial reporting treatment is determined by its measurement focus. Enterprise accounting uses a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities are included on the Statement of Net Assets. Operating statements present increases (e.g., revenues) and decreases (e.g., expenses) in net total assets.

Basis of accounting determines when transactions are recorded in the financial records and reported on the financial statements. PCS prepares financial statements using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded when the exchange takes place. Revenues resulting from non-exchange transactions, in which PCS receives value without directly giving equal value in return, such as grants and entitlements, are recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the fiscal year when the resources are

required to be used or the fiscal year when the use is first permitted; matching requirements, in which PCS must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose; and expenditure requirements, in which resources are provided to PCS on a reimbursement basis. Expenses are recognized at the time they are incurred.

#### 3. Cash

All monies received by PCS are deposited in demand deposit accounts.

#### 4. Budgetary Process

Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapter 5705.391 PCS prepares and adopts an annual budget which includes estimated revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year and a five year forecast of revenues and expenditures. PCS will from time to time adopt budget revisions as necessary.

#### 5. Due From Other Governments and Accounts Receivable

Moneys due PCS for the year ended June 30, 2007 are recorded as Due From Other Governments and as Accounts Receivable. A current asset for the receivable amount is recorded at the time of the event causing the moneys to be due.

#### 6. Prepaid Employee Withholding

Payments made to vendors for voluntary employee benefits prior to collection from the employee that benefit future periods are recorded as prepaid employee withholding. A current asset for the prepaid amount is recorded at the time of the payment and is subsequently reduced upon collection by payroll withholding.

#### 7. Capital Assets, Mortgage Fees and Depreciation

Capital assets are capitalized at cost and updated for additions and retirements during the year. Donated Capital assets are recorded at their fair market values as of the dates received. All items with a useful life of one year or greater and a value of \$500 or more are capitalized. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized.

Mortgage Fees have been capitalized at cost and are being amortized over the term of the mortgage for which they have been incurred.

All capital assets are depreciated except for land. Depreciation of buildings, building improvements, computers, office equipment and furniture and equipment is computed using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives. Improvements to capital assets are depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related capital assets. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

#### 8. Intergovernmental Revenues

PCS currently participates in the State Foundation Program and the State Poverty Based Assistance Program. Revenues received from these programs are recognized as operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met.

State and Federal Grants and Entitlements are recognized as non-operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements have been met.

Amounts awarded under the above named programs for the 2007 school year totaled \$2,214,780.

#### 9. Private Grants and Contributions

PCS received grants and contributions from private sources to support the schools programs. Private grants and contributions are recognized as non-operating revenues in the accounting period in which they are received. Amounts received for the 2007 school year totaled \$6,744.

#### 10. Compensated Absences

Vacation is taken in a manner which corresponds with the school calendar; therefore, PCS does not accrue vacation time as a liability.

Sick leave benefits are earned at the rate of one and one-quarter day per month and can be accrued up to a maximum of one hundred twenty days. PCS will accept the transfer of sick days from another school district up to the maximum accrual amount. No financial accrual for sick time is made since unused sick time is not paid to employees upon employment termination.

#### 11. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

#### 12. Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue arises when assets are recognized before revenue recognition criteria have been satisfied. The deferred revenue for PCS consists of materials fees received in the current year which pertains to the next school year.

#### III. Deposits

At fiscal year end June 30, 2007, the carrying amount of PCS' deposits totaled \$180,611 and its bank balance was \$217,090. Based on the criteria described in GASB Statement No. 40, "Deposit and Investment Risk Disclosure," as of June 30, 2007, \$117,090 of the bank balance was exposed to custodial risk as discussed below, while \$100,000 was covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of bank failure, PCS will not be able to recover the deposits. All deposits are collateralized with eligible securities in amounts equal to at least 105% of the carrying value of the deposits. Such collateral, as permitted by the Ohio Revised Code, is held in single financial institution collateral pools at the Federal Reserve Banks or at member banks of the federal reserve system, in the name of the respective depository bank and pledged as a pool of collateral against all of the public deposits it holds or as specific collateral held at the Federal Reserve Bank in the name of PCS.

#### VI. Day Drive School Building Purchase

On November 28, 2003, PCS purchased the building it occupied at 7667 Day Drive, Parma. The purchase price of \$1,200,000, along with other purchase costs totaling \$7,172, have been capitalized and will be depreciated over a forty year period. All operations of PCS are located at this site.

#### VII. Mortgage Notes Payable

On November 26, 2003, PCS entered into two mortgage agreements relating to the purchase of the property at 7667 Day Drive (see note VI).

A first mortgage note in the amount of \$900,000 is held by US Bank National Association. The note is for a term of fifteen years with an interest rate of 6.49 percent per annum. The Ohio School Facilities Commission has guaranteed the first mortgage up to \$765,000.

A second mortgage note in the amount of \$300,000 is held by Thomas J. Coury, Trustee of the Thomas Coury Revocable Inter Vivos Trust (Coury Trust) and is subordinate to the first mortgage. The note is for a term seven years with an interest rate of 8.00 percent per annum.

During fiscal year 2007 principal was reduced by \$42,177 for US Bank National Association and \$40,663 for Coury Trust. Interest expense totaled \$51,761 for US Bank National Association and \$15,176 for Coury Trust. As of June 30, 2007 outstanding principal balances are \$764,604 for the first mortgage and \$170,796 for the second mortgage. Interest payable totaling \$4,135 due US Bank National Association and \$1,139 for Coury Trust has been recorded as a current liability as of June 30, 2007. #### VIII. Risk Management

#### 1. Property and Liability Insurance

PCS is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. For fiscal year 2007, PCS contracted with Cincinnati Insurance Company for all of its' insurance.

General liability is covered at \$4,000,000 single occurrence limit and \$5,000,000 aggregated. Hired and Non-Owned Vehicles are covered at \$500,000 combined single limit of liability. Other coverage includes Employee Crime, School Leaders Errors & Omissions, Sexual Abuse and Misconduct, Electronic Data Processing and Business Interruption.

#### 2. Workers' Compensation

PCS makes premium payments to the Ohio Worker's Compensation System for employee injury coverage. There have been two claims filed by PCS employees with the Ohio Worker's Compensation System between January 1, 2000 and June 30, 2007. The total payments made for these claims have been \$956. In the opinion of management, these claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of PCS as June 30, 2007.

#### 3. Employee Medical, Dental, and Life Benefits

PCS provides medical, dental and life insurance benefits to all full time employees. Employees participate in premium payments through pretax payroll deductions. Total insurance benefits paid by PCS for the fiscal year is \$79,177.

#### IX. Defined Benefit Pension Plans

#### 1. School Employees Retirement System

PCS contributes to the School Employees Retirement System of Ohio (SERS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. SERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Authority to establish and amend benefits is provided by state statute per Chapter 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code. SERS issues a publicly available, stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be

obtained by writing to the School Employees Retirement System, 300 East Broad St., Suite 100, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3746.

Plan members are required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salary and PCS is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The current rate for PCS is 14 percent of annual covered payroll. A portion of PCS' contribution is used to fund pension obligations with the remainder being used to fund health care benefits; for fiscal year 2007 (the latest information available), 10.68 percent of annual covered salary was the portion to fund pension obligations. The contribution requirements of plan members and employers are established and may be amended, up to a statutory maximum amount, by the SERS' Retirement Board. PCS' required contribution for pension obligations to SERS for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2007, 2006 and 2005 were \$9,507, \$5,657 and \$3,839. For fiscal year 2007, all required contributions have been made.

#### 2. State Teachers Retirement System

PCS participates in the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio), a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system. STRS Ohio provides retirement and disability benefits to members and death and survivor benefits to beneficiaries. STRS Ohio issues a stand-alone financial report that may be obtained by writing to STRS Ohio, 275 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3771, by calling (614)227-4090, or by visiting the STRS Ohio web site at www.strsoh.org.

New members have a choice of three retirement plans, a Defined Benefit (DB) Plan, a Defined Contribution (DC) Plan and a Combined Plan. The DB plan offers an annual retirement allowance based on final average salary times a percentage that varies based on years of service, or an allowance based on member contributions and earned interest matched by STRS Ohio funds divided by an actuarially determined annuity factor. The DC Plan allows members to place all their member contributions and employer contributions equal to 10.5 percent of earned compensation into an investment account. Investment decisions are made by the member. A member is eligible to receive a retirement benefit at age 50 and termination of employment. The Combined Plan offers features of both the DC and the DB Plan. In the Combined Plan, member contributions are invested by the member, and employer contributions are used to fund the defined benefit payment at a reduced level from the regular DB Plan. DC and Combined Plan members will transfer to the Defined Benefit Plan during the fifth year of membership unless they permanently select the DC or Combined Plan. Existing members with

less than five years of service credit as of June 30, 2001, were given the option of making a one time irrevocable decision to transfer their account balances from the existing DB Plan into the DC or the Combined Plan. This option expired on December 31, 2001. Benefits are established by Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code.

A DB or Combined Plan member with five or more years credited service who becomes disabled may qualify for a disability benefit. Eligible spouses and dependents of these active members who die before retirement may qualify for survivor benefits. Members in the DC Plan who become disabled are entitled only to their account balance. If a member dies before retirement benefits begin, the member's designated beneficiary is entitled to receive the member's account balance.

For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007, plan members were required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salary. PCS was required to contribute 14 percent. For fiscal year 2007 the portion used to fund pension obligations was 13 percent. Contribution rates are established by the State Teachers Retirement Board, upon recommendations of its consulting actuary, not to exceed statutory maximum rates of 10 percent for members and 14 percent for employers. Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code provides statutory authority for member and employer contributions.

PCS' required contribution for pension obligations to STRS Ohio for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2007, 2006 and 2005 were \$117,277, \$112,917 and \$87,637. For fiscal year 2007, all required contributions have been made.

#### X. Post-Employment Benefits

PCS provides comprehensive health care benefits to retired teachers and their dependents through the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio) and to retired non-certified employees and their dependents through the School Employees Retirement System (SERS). Benefits include hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs and reimbursement of monthly Medicare premiums. Benefit provisions and the obligations to contribute are established by the Systems based on authority granted by State statute. Both systems are on a pay-as-you-go basis.

All STRS Ohio retirees who participated in the DB or Combined Plans and their dependents are eligible for health care coverage. The STRS Ohio Board has statutory authority over how much, if any, of the health care costs will be absorbed by STRS Ohio. All benefit recipients pay a portion of the health care cost in the form of a monthly

premium. By law, the cost of coverage paid from STRS Ohio funds is included in the employer contribution rate, currently 14 percent of covered payroll. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007, the STRS Ohio Board allocated employer contributions equal to one percent of covered payroll to the Health Care Stabilization Fund. For PCS, this amount equaled \$9,021 during fiscal 2007.

STRS Ohio pays health care benefits from the Health Care Stabilization Fund. At June 30, 2006, (the latest information available) the balance in the Fund was \$3.5 billion. For the year ended June 30, 2006, net health care costs paid by STRS were \$282,743,000 and STRS had 119,184 eligible benefit recipients.

For SERS, coverage is made available to service retirees with ten or more years of qualifying service credit, and to disability and survivor benefit recipients. All retirees and beneficiaries are required to pay a portion of their premiums for health care. The portion is based on years of service, Medicare eligibility and retirement status.

After the allocation for the basic benefits, the remainder of the employer's 14 percent contribution is allocated to providing health care benefits. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007, employer contributions to fund health care benefits were 3.32 percent of covered payroll, compared to 3.42 percent of covered payroll in fiscal year 2006. In addition, SERS levies a surcharge to fund health care benefits equal to 14 percent of the difference between a minimum pay and the member's pay, pro-rated for partial service credit. For fiscal year 2007, the minimum pay was established at \$35,800. However, the surcharge is capped at 2 percent of each employer's SERS salaries. For PCS, the amount contributed to fund health care benefits, including surcharge, during the 2007 fiscal year equaled \$4,299.

The surcharge added to the unallocated portion of the 14 percent employer contribution rate, provides for maintenance of the asset target level of the health care fund. The target level of the health care reserve is 150 percent of the projected claims less premium contributions for the next fiscal year. Expenses for health care for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 (the latest information available), were \$158,751,207. At June 30, 2006, SERS had net assets available for health care benefits of \$295.6 million. SERS has 59,492 participants eligible to receive health care benefits.

#### **XI.** Contingencies

#### 1. Grants

PCS received financial assistance from Federal and State agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs requires compliance with terms and conditions, specified in the grant agreements and are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of PCS. However, in the opinion of management, any such disallowed claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of PCS at June 30, 2007.

#### 2. Litigation

A lawsuit entitled *Beverly Blount-Hill et al. v. State of Ohio, et al., Case #: 3:04CV197* was filed in the US District Court, Southern District of Ohio, Western Division in October 2004. The suit alleges that the funding provisions of the Ohio Community Schools Act, O.R.C. Section 3314 violate both the Ohio and Federal constitutions. If the funding scheme is determined to be unconstitutional, it could have financial ramifications for all community/charter schools. The case is currently pending, and the effect of this suit, if any, on PCS cannot be presently determined.

#### 3. Enrollment FTE

The Ohio Department of Education conducts reviews of enrollment and full-time equivalency (FTE) calculations made by the schools. These reviews are conducted to ensure the schools are reporting accurate student enrollment data to the State, upon which state foundation funding is calculated. The conclusions of this review could result in state funding being adjusted. As of the date of this report adjustments to the state funding received during fiscal year 2007 are reflected in the financial statements.

#### **XII.** Sponsorship and Management Agreements

PCS entered into an agreement with Lucas County Educational Service Center (LCESC) to provide sponsorship and oversight services as required by law. The agreement is effective October 16, 2003. Sponsorship fees are calculated as a percentage of state funds received by PCS, from the State of Ohio. During the 2007 fiscal year the fee changed from 1% to 1.5%. The total amount due from PCS for fiscal year 2007 was \$28,028 of which \$2,534 was outstanding as of June 30, 2007.

PCS entered into an agreement with Constellation Schools (CS) to provide legal, financial, and business management services for fiscal year 2007. The agreement was for a period of one year, effective July 1, 2006. Management fees are calculated as 11.5% of the Fiscal Year 2007 Foundation payment received by PCS, as reported in the Monthly Community School Foundation Report. The total amount due from PCS for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007 was \$234,875 all of which was paid prior to June 30, 2007.

In addition, PCS is participating in a payroll bonus reserve established through CS. Payroll bonus reserve fees are calculated as 1% of the Fiscal Year 2007 Foundation payment received by PCS, as reported in the Monthly Community School Foundation Report. The total amount due from PCS for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007 was \$20,424 all of which was paid prior to June 30, 2007.

#### **XIII.** Subsequent Events – Bond Financing

During the fall of 2007 Constellation Schools purchased a property from the City of Parma which it leases to PCS to house grades 4 through 9. The lease agreement between Constellation Schools and PCS requires PCS to pay, on a pro-rated basis, a portion of the operational expenses of the building. Constellations Schools, which also occupies the building, provides management services to PCS (see Note XII).

On January 23, 2008 PCS and Constellation Schools sold both of the buildings they own and occupy to The Industrial Development Authority of the County of Pima (IDA). As part of a financing arrangement PCS will lease both properties from IDA who issued bonds for the purchase and renovation of the existing structures. Constellation Schools will sub-lease their space from PCS and pay a pro-rated portion of the operational expenses of the building it occupies with PCS.

We have audited the financial statements of the Parma Community School, Cuyahoga County, Ohio, (the School) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007, and have issued our report thereon dated February 7, 2008. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*.

#### **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the School's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our audit procedures for expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not to opine on the effectiveness of the School's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we have not opined on the effectiveness of the School's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the School's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with its applicable accounting basis, such that there is more than a remote likelihood that the School's internal control will not prevent or detect a more than inconsequential financial statement misstatement.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies resulting in more than a remote likelihood that the School's internal control will not prevent or detect a material financial statement misstatement.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all internal control deficiencies that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider material weaknesses, as defined above.

We noted certain matters that we reported to the School's management in a separate letter dated February 7, 2008.
