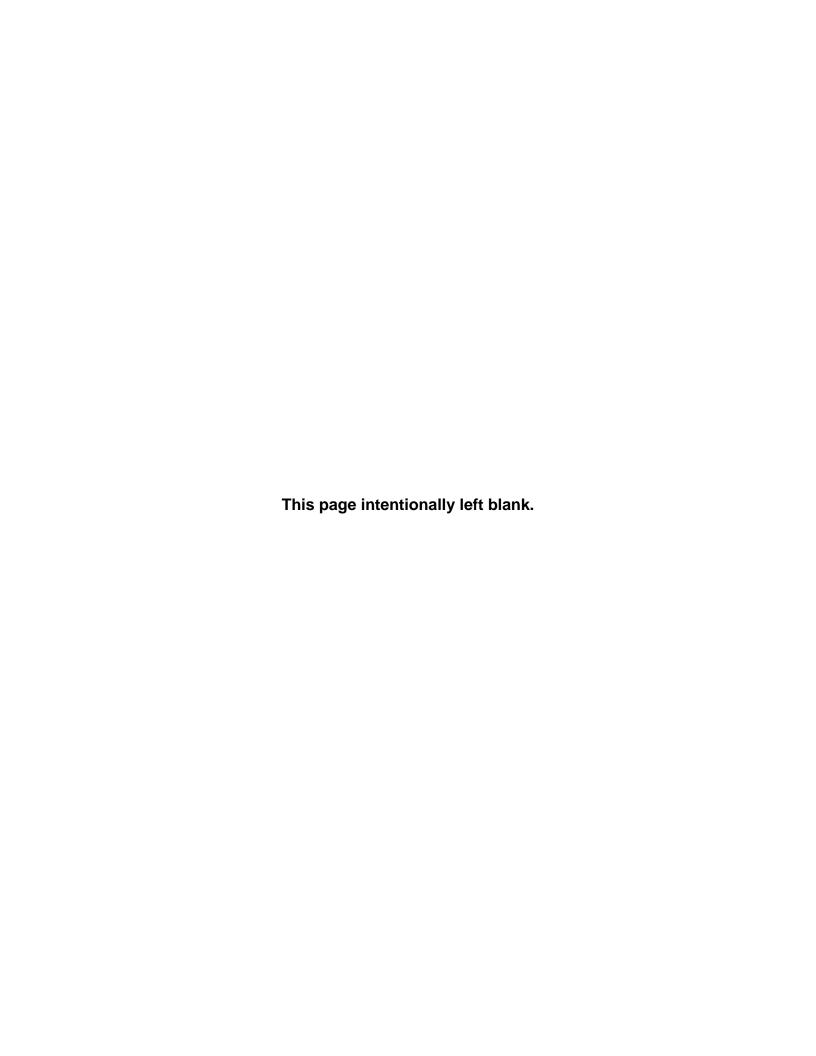

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

To the Governing Board:

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of Phoenix Academy, Lucas County, Ohio (the Academy), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Academy's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to reasonably assure whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion the basic financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Phoenix Academy, as of June 30, 2009, and the changes in its financial position and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated June 24, 2010, on our consideration of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. While we did not opine on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance, that report describes the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. You should read it in conjunction with this report in assessing the results of our audit.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2009 UNAUDITED

The discussion and analysis of the Phoenix Academy's (the Academy) financial performance provides an overall view of the Academy's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the Academy's financial performance as a whole; readers should also review the notes to the basic financial statements and financial statements to enhance their understanding of the Academy's financial performance.

Financial Highlights

- Total Assets were \$4,337,490.
- ➤ Total Liabilities were \$667,823.
- ➤ Total Change in Net Assets was an increase of \$1,799,802.

Using this Annual Financial Report

This report consists of three parts, the Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A), the basic financial statements, and notes to those statements. The basic financial statements include a statement of net assets, a statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets, and statement of cash flows.

Reporting the Academy as a Whole

One of the most important questions asked about the Academy is, "As a whole, what is the Academy's financial condition as a result of the year's activities?" The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets, which appear first in the Academy's financial statements, report information on the Academy as a whole and its activities in a way that helps you answer this question. We prepare these statements to include all assets and liabilities, using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when the cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Academy's net assets – the difference between assets and liabilities, as reported in the statement of net assets—as one way to measure the Academy's financial health, or financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in the Academy's net assets—as reported in the Statement of Net Assets—are indicators of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. The relationship between revenues and expenses is the Academy's operating results. However, the Academy's goal is to provide services to our students, not to generate profits as commercial entities do. One must consider many other non-financial factors, such as the quality of the education provided and the safety of the school, to assess the overall health of the Academy.

The Statement of Nets Assets and the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets report the activities for the Academy, which encompass all of the Academy's services, including instruction, support services, and community services. Unrestricted state aid and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2009 UNAUDITED

Statement of Net Assets

The Statement of Net Assets answers the question, "How did we do financially during 2009?" This statement includes all assets and liabilities, both financial and capital, and short-term and long-term using the accrual basis of accounting and economic resources focus, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. This basis of accounting considers all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when cash is received or paid.

Table 1 provides a summary of the Academy's net assets for fiscal year 2009 compared to fiscal year 2008:

Total assets increased by \$304,953, which represents a 7.56 percent increase from fiscal year 2008. While cash and cash equivalents decreased by \$440,018, total receivables also decreased by \$64,361. Total liabilities decreased by \$1,494,849, which represents a 69.1 decrease from 2008. The Academy's net assets increased by \$1,799,802, mainly from the purchase of a new building in the amount of \$1,124,315.

The Academy's business-type activities consist of enterprise activity. Community Schools receive no support from tax levies.

There was a decrease in revenues of \$494,736 and a decrease in expenses of \$1,446,051 from fiscal year 2008. Of the decrease in revenues, federal and state entitlement and grant revenue decreased by \$502,829.

The expense for purchased services decreased by \$1,535,559 from fiscal year 2008. A new building was purchased this fiscal year for \$1,124,315 which was capitalized instead of being expensed which is the reason for the large decrease in expenses.

Capital Assets

At the end of fiscal year 2009 the Academy had \$1,171,070 (net of \$41,957 in accumulated depreciation) invested in furniture, equipment and a building. The building was purchased in June 2009. The Academy's asset capitalization minimum is \$5,000. Table 3 shows fiscal year 2009 balances compared to fiscal year 2008:

Current Financial Issues

The Academy was formed in 2003 sponsored by Toledo Public Schools. During the 2008-2009 school year, there were approximately 762 students enrolled in the Academy. Per pupil base formula amount for fiscal year 2009 amounted to \$5,732 per student. The Academy receives most of its finances from state aid.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2009

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE ACADEMY AND REPORTING ENTITY

Phoenix Academy (the Academy) is a nonprofit corporation established pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapters 3314 and 1702 to address the needs of students in grades nine through twelve. The Academy is part of the State's education program, is independent of any school district and is nonsectarian in its programs, admission policies, employment practices, and all other operations. The Academy may sue and be sued, acquire facilities as needed, and contract for any services necessary for the operation of the Academy. The Academy qualifies as an exempt organization under Section 501c(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Academy's tax-exempt status.

The Academy was approved for operation under a contract with the Toledo Public Schools (the Sponsor) for a period of five years commencing September 1, 2003. The Sponsor is responsible for evaluating the performance of the Academy and has the authority to deny renewal of the contract at its expiration or terminate the contract prior to its expiration.

The Academy operates under the direction of a five member Governing Board. The Governing Board is responsible for carrying out the provisions of the contract, which include but are not limited to, state-mandated provisions regarding student population, curriculum, academic goals, performance standards, admission standards, and qualifications of teachers. The Governing Board controls the Academy's one instructional/support facility and three satellite facilities staffed by 14 non-certified and 27 certificated full time teaching personnel who provide services to 767 students

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the Academy have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to a governmental nonprofit organization. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The Academy also applies Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations issued on or before November 30, 1989, to its proprietary activities, provided they do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant of the Academy's accounting policies are described below.

A. Basis of Presentation

The Academy's basic financial statements consist of a statement of net assets, a statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets, and a statement of cash flows.

Enterprise fund reporting focuses on the determination of the change in net assets, financial position, and cash flows.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2009 (Continued)

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

B. Measurement Focus

Enterprise accounting uses a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities are included on the statements of net assets. The statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets presents increases (i.e., revenues) and decreases (i.e., expenses) in net total assets. The statement of cash flows provides information about how the Academy finances and meets the cash flow needs of its enterprise activities.

C. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting determines when transactions are recorded in the financial records and reported on the financial statements. The Academy's financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting.

Revenues resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded on the accrual basis when the exchange takes place.

Revenues resulting from non-exchange transactions, in which the Academy receives value without directly giving equal value in return, such as grants and entitlements, are recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when use is first permitted; matching requirements, in which the Academy must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose; and expenditure requirements, in which the resources are provided to Academy on reimbursement basis.

Expenses are recognized at the time they are incurred.

D. Budgetary Process

Unlike other public schools located in the State of Ohio, community schools are not required to follow budgetary provisions set forth in Ohio Revised Code Chapter 5705, except under Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.391, the Academy must prepare a five year spending plan and submit it to the Ohio Superintendent of Public Instruction.

E. Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Academy's Treasurer accounts for all monies received by the Academy. All cashed received by the Treasurer is maintained in separate bank accounts in the Academy's name.

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows and for presentation on the statement of net assets, investments with original maturities of three months or less at the time they are purchased by the Academy are considered to be cash equivalents. Investments with an initial maturity of more than three months that are not purchased from the pool are reported as investments.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2009 (Continued)

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

During fiscal year 2009, investments were limited to STAR Ohio. STAR Ohio is an investment pool, managed by the State Treasurer's Office, which allows governments within the State to pool their funds for investment purposes. STAR Ohio is not registered with the SEC as an investment company, but does operate in a manner consistent with Rule 2a7 of the Investment Act of 1940. Investments in STAR Ohio are valued at STAR Ohio's share price, which is the price the investment could be sold for on June 30, 2009.

F. Prepaid Items

Payments made to vendors for services that will benefit periods beyond June 30, 2008, are recorded as prepaid items using the consumption method. A current asset for the prepaid amount is recorded at the time of the purchase and an expense is reported in the fiscal year in which services are consumed.

G. Capital Assets

Capital assets are capitalized at cost (or estimated historical cost) and updated for additions and retirements during the fiscal year. Donated capital assets are recorded at their fair market values as of the date received. The Academy maintains a capitalization threshold of five thousand dollars. The Academy does not possess any infrastructure. Improvements are capitalized; the costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not.

All reported capital assets are depreciated. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the following useful lives:

H. Net Assets

Net assets represent the difference between assets and liabilities. Net assets are reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through the enabling legislation adopted by the Academy or through external restrictions imposed by creditor, grantor, or laws or regulations of other governments. Restricted Net Assets include restricted for permanent improvements and restricted for state and federal grants.

The Academy applies restricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - (Continued)

I. Operating Revenues and Expenses

Operating revenues are those revenues that are generated directly from the primary activities. For the Academy, these revenues are primarily foundation payments from the State. Operating expenses are necessary costs incurred to provide the goods or services that are the primary activity of the Academy. Revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating.

J. Intergovernmental Revenue

The Academy currently participates in the State Foundation Basic Aid Program, and the State Special Education Program. Revenues from these programs are recognized as operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements are met.

Grants and entitlements are recognized as non-operating revenues in the accounting period in which all eligibility requirements are met.

Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the fiscal year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when use is first permitted, matching requirements, in which the Academy must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose, and expenditures requirements, in which the resources are provided to the Academy on a reimbursement basis.

K. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

NOTE 3 - DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

At fiscal year end June 30, 2009, the carrying amount of the Academy's deposits was \$1,639,594 and the bank balance was \$2,740,755. Based on the criteria described in GASB Statement No. 40, "Deposit and Investment Risk Disclosure," as of June 30, 2009, \$250,000 was covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation and \$2,490,755 was exposed to custodial credit risk.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of bank failure, the Academy will not be able to recover the deposits. All deposits are collateralized with eligible securities in amounts equal to at least 105% of the carrying value of deposits. Such collateral, as permitted by the Ohio Revised Code, is held in single financial institution collateral pools at the Federal Reserve Banks or at member banks of the federal reserve system, in the name of the respective depository and pledged as a pool of collateral against all of the public deposits it holds or as specific collateral held at the Federal Reserve Bank in the name of the Academy.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2009 (Continued)

NOTE 3 - DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS (Continued)

The Academy had no deposit policy for custodial risk beyond the requirements of State statute. Ohio law requires that deposits be either insured or be protected by eligible securities pledged to and deposited either with Academy or a qualified trustee by the financial institution as security for repayment, or by a collateral pool of eligible securities deposited with a qualified trustee and pledged to secure the repayment of all public monies deposited in the financial institution whose market value at all times shall be at least one hundred five percent of the deposits being secure.

The Academy's investments total \$1,022,523 (fair value) that is maintained in a STAR Ohio Account. At June 30, 2009, STAR Ohio received the Standard &Poor's highest credit rating of AAA.

NOTE 4 - RECEIVABLES

Receivables at June 30, 2009, consisted of accounts receivable and intergovernmental receivables from various grants which are considered collectible in full.

NOTE 6 - RISK MANAGEMENT

A. Property and Liability

The Academy is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. For the fiscal year ended 2009, the Academy obtained insurance thru broker Hylant Insurance with the following insurance coverage:

There have been no claims paid for the past two fiscal years.

B. Workers' Compensation

The Academy does not pay directly into the State Worker's Compensation System. All employees are contracted through Toledo Public Schools, which pays the Workers' Compensation System based on their payroll. The premium is calculated by multiplying the monthly total gross payroll by a factor that is calculated by the State.

NOTE 7 - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLANS

A. School Employee Retirement System

The Academy contributes to State Employees Retirement System of Ohio (SERS), a cost-sharing multiple employer defined benefit pension plan. SERS provides retirement and disability benefits; annual cost-of-living adjustments; and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Authority to establish and amend benefits is provided by Chapter 3309 of the Ohio Revised Code. SERS issues a publicly available stand—alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to School Employees Retirement System, 300 East Broad Street, Suite 100, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3476 or by calling toll free (800) 878-5853. It is also posted on SERS' website at www.ohser.org under Forms and Publications.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2009 (Continued)

NOTE 7 - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLANS (Continued)

For the fiscal year 2009, plan members were required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salary and the Academy was required to contribute 14 percent of annual covered payroll; 9.09 percent was the portion used to fund pension obligations. The contribution requirements of plan members and employers are established and may be amended, up to statutory maximum amounts, by the SERS Retirement Board. The Academy's required contribution for pension obligations to SERS for the fiscal year June 30, 2009, 2008 and 2007 was \$3,446, \$4,091 and \$9,981; 100.0 percent has been contributed for fiscal years 2009, 2008, and 2007.

B. State Teachers Retirement System

The Academy participates in the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer public employee retirement system. STRS Ohio provides retirement and disability benefits to members and death and survivor benefits to beneficiaries. STRS Ohio issues a stand-alone financial report that may be obtained by writing to STRS Ohio, 275 E. Broad St., Columbus, OH 43215-3771, by calling (888) 227-7877, or by visiting the STRS Ohio Web site at www.strsoh.org.

New members have a choice of three retirement plans, a Defined Benefit (DB) Plan, a Defined Contribution (DC) Plan and a Combined Plan. The DB plan offers an annual retirement allowance based on final average salary times a percentage that varies based on years of service, or an allowance based on member contributions and earned interest matched by STRS Ohio funds divided by an actuarially determined annuity factor. The DC Plan allows members to place all their member contributions and employer contributions equal to 10.5 percent of earned compensation into an investment account. Investment decisions are made by the member. A member is eligible to receive a retirement benefit at age 50 and termination of employment. The member may elect to receive a lifetime monthly annuity or a lump sum withdrawal. The Combined Plan offers features of both the DC Plan and the DB Plan. In the Combined Plan, member contributions are invested by the member, and employer contributions are used to fund the defined benefit payment at a reduced level from the regular DB Plan. The DB portion of the Combined Plan payment is payable to a member on or after age 60; the DC portion of the account may be taken as a lump sum or converted to a lifetime monthly annuity at age 50. Benefits are established by Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code.

A DB or Combined Plan member with five or more years credited service who becomes disabled may qualify for a disability benefit. Eligible spouses and dependents of these active members who die before retirement may qualify for survivor benefits. Members in the DC Plan who become disabled are entitled only to their account balance. If a member dies before retirement benefits begin, the member's designated beneficiary is entitled to receive the member's account balance

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2009 (Continued)

NOTE 7 - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLANS (Continued)

For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009, plan members were required to contribute 10 percent of their annual covered salaries. The Academy was required to contribute 14 percent; 13 percent was the portion used to fund pension obligations. Contribution rates are established by the State Teachers Retirement Board, upon recommendations of its consulting actuary, not to exceed statutory maximum rates of 10 percent for members and 14 percent for employers. Chapter 3307 of the Ohio Revised Code provides statutory authority for member and employer contributions.

The Academy's required contribution for pension obligations for the fiscal years 2009, 2008, and 2007 was \$206,808, \$231,525 and \$196,978; 81.0 percent has been contributed for fiscal year 2009, and 100.0 perscent for 2008, and 2007.

NOTE 8 - POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

A. School Employee Retirement System

The Academy participates in two cost-sharing multiple employer defined benefit OPEB plans administered by the School Employees Retirement System for non-certificated retirees and their beneficiaries, a Health Care Plan and a Medicare Part B Plan. The Health Care Plan includes hospitalization and physicians' fees through several types of plans including HMO's, PPO's and traditional indemnity plans as well as a prescription drug program. The Medicare Part B Plan reimburses Medicare Part B premiums paid by eligible retirees and beneficiaries up to a statutory limit. Benefit provisions and the obligations to contribute are established by the System based on authority granted by State statute. The financial reports of both Plans are included in the SERS Comprehensive Annual Financial Report which is available by contacting SERS at 300 East Broad St., Suite 100, Columbus, Ohio 43215-3746.

State statute permits SERS to fund the health care benefits through employer contributions. Each year, after the allocation for statutorily required benefits, the Retirement Board allocates the remainder of the employer contribution of 14 percent of covered payroll to the Health Care Fund. The Health Care Fund was established and is administered in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 401h. For 2009, 4.91 percent of covered payroll was allocated to Health Care and Medicare B Funds. In addition, employers pay a surcharge for employees earning less than an actuarially determined amount; for 2009, this amount was \$618.

Active employee members do not contribute to the Health Care Plan. Retireesand their beneficiaries are required to pay a health care premium that varies depending on the plan selected, the number of qualified years of service, Medicare eligibility and retirement status.

The Academy's contributions for health care for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009, 2008, and 2007, were \$1,821, \$2,162, and \$3,939 respectively; 100.0 percent has been contributed for fiscal years 2009, 2008, and 2007.

B. State Teachers Retirement System

Plan Description – The Academy contributes to the cost sharing multiple employer defined benefit Health Plan administered by the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS Ohio) for eligible retirees who participated in the defined benefit or combined pension plans offered by STRS Ohio. Benefits include hospitalization, physicians' fees, prescription drugs and reimbursement of monthly Medicare Part B premiums. The Plan is included in the report of STRS Ohio which may be obtained by visiting www.strsoh.org or by calling (888) 227-7877.

Funding Policy – Ohio law authorizes STRS Ohio to offer the Plan and gives the Retirement Board authority over how much, if any, of the health care costs will be absorbed by STRS Ohio. Active employee members do not contribute to the Plan. All benefit recipients pay a monthly premium. Under Ohio law, funding for post-employment health care may be deducted from employer contributions. For 2009, STRS Ohio allocated employer contributions equal to 1 percent of covered payroll to the Health Care Stabilization Fund. The Academy's contributions for health care for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009, 2008, and 2007, were \$15,908, \$17,810, and \$15,152, respectively; 81.0 percent has been contributed for fiscal year 2009, and 100.0 percent for 2008, and 2007.

NOTE 9 - OTHER EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Most employees of the Academy are employed by Toledo Public Schools. Policies and procedures are approved by the Toledo Public School's Board of Education and are applied to Compensated Absences, Insurance Benefits, and Deferred Compensation of staff purchased from Toledo Public Schools by contract.

NOTE 10 - MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT

The Academy entered into a contract, effective July 1, 2003, through June 30, 2004, renewable each year up to five years, with Toledo Public Schools (TPS) for educational and financial management services.

Toledo Public Schools Board passed a Resolution on June 23, 2009 authorizing to negotiate and finalize an Amended and Restated Contract for Community School (the "Amended and Restated Contract"), with the Academy, pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapter 3314, for the purpose of extending the term of the Contract through June 30, 2013, and amending certain provisions of the Contract to comply with changes to Chapter 3314 of the Ohio Revised Code enacted since the date of the Contract.

Total expenses paid to TPS were \$5,353,759 of which \$658,885 is recognized as an amount due to TPS at fiscal year ended June 30, 2009. The total amount of consists of sponsorship fees equal to 3 percent of foundation revenues for \$168,914, and the remaining was purchased services.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2009 (Continued)

NOTE 10 - MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT - (Continued)

The annual fee is paid in the subsequent fiscal year totaling the lesser of: (a) 100 percent of the amount in excess of \$500,000 of the unencumbered general operating fund balance, or (b) the amount of that balance that is in excess of the minimum financial amount required to be eligible to sponsor a community school in the State of Ohio (currently \$500,000). For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009, the Academy did not recognize a liability to TPS for it's general operating fund balance because it was not in excess of \$500,000.

Terms of the contract require TPS to provide the following:

- All labor, materials, and supervision necessary for the provision of educational services to students, and the management, operation, and maintenance of the Academy;
- Implementation and administration of the Educational Program, including the selection of instructional materials, equipment and supplies, and the administration of any and all extracurricular and co-curricular activities and programs;
- All personnel functions, including professional development for the Academy principal, all instructional personnel, and support staff;
- All aspects of the business administration of the Academy;
- Transportation and food service for the Academy;
- A projected annual budget prior to each year;
- Detailed statements of all revenues received, from whatever source, and detailed statements of all expenditures for services rendered to or on behalf of the Academy, whether incurred on-site or off-site, upon request;
- Annual audits in compliance with state law and regulations' performances, upon request;
- Reports on Academy operations, finances, and students' performances, upon request; and,
- Any Other function necessary or expedient for the administration of the Academy.

NOTE 12 - OPERATING LEASES - LESSEE DISCLOSURE

The Academy entered into an extended lease for the period August 28, 2008 through August 28, 2009 with the Sponsor to lease space to house the Academy. In fiscal year 2009, expense under the lease for the Academy totaled \$244,175 with rent of \$40,516 recognized as Payable to Toledo Public Schools at June 30, 2009. The lease has been discontinued

The Academy entered into a lease for 3 years in fiscal year 2008 for 3 years with Pearson Digital Learning for use of NovaNet software. The Academy paid \$826,645 for 3 years in advance. As of June 30, 2009, there was an outstanding prepaid in the amount for \$384,979.

The Academy entered into a lease for the period September 8, 2005 through September 8, 2008, with Toledo Great Eastern Limited to lease additional space to house the Academy. The lease can be renewed for three additional years. The Academy utilized the space through November 30, 2008. In fiscal year 2009, expense under the lease for the Academy net of security deposit totaled \$22,298.

The Academy entered into a lease for the period September 1, 2005 through September 1, 2008 with Joseph Brothers Company, LLC to lease additional space to house the Academy. The lease can be extended and was extended for the fiscal year 2009 through September 30, 2011. In fiscal year 2009, expense under the lease for the Academy totaled \$21,721.

The Academy entered into a lease for the period September 19, 2005 through September 19, 2008 with McCord Plaza Development to lease additional space to house the Academy. The lease can be extended and was again extended for the fiscal year 2009. In fiscal year 2009, expenses under the lease for the Academy totaled \$22,532.

The Academy entered into a lease for the period August 25, 2008 through August 24, 2009 with East Toledo Family Center to lease additional space to house the Academy. The lease can be extended. In fiscal year 2009, expenses under the lease for the Academy totaled \$36,000.

NOTE 13 - CONTINGENCIES

A. Grants

The Academy receives financial assistance from federal and state agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs generally requires compliance with terms and conditions specified in the grant agreements and is subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of the operating fund. However, in the opinion of management, any such disallowed claims will not have a material adverse effect on any of the financial statements included herein or on the overall financial position of the Academy at June 30, 2009.

B. State Funding

The Ohio Department of Education conducts reviews of enrollment data and full-time equivalency (FTE) calculations made by the Schools. These reviews are conducted to ensure the Schools are reporting accurate student enrollment data to the State, upon which state foundation funding is calculated. For fiscal year 2009, the review resulted in an increase in funding for \$24,355.

NOTE 14 – RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Ms. Joan Kuchcinski and Joan Reasonover are board members for both Phoenix and Polly Fox Academies that are sponsored by Toledo Public Schools (TPS). Both are also employed by TPS.

Ms. Kuchcinski received \$1,500 and Ms. Reasonover received \$1,500 in compensation as board members from the Academy.

We have audited the basic financial statements of Phoenix Academy, Lucas County, (the Academy) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, and have issued our report thereon dated June 24, 2010. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Academy's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our audit procedures for expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not to opine on the effectiveness of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we have not opined on the effectiveness of the Academy's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the Academy's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with its applicable accounting basis, such that there is more than a remote likelihood that the Academy's internal control will not prevent or detect a more-than-inconsequential financial statement misstatement.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies resulting in more than a remote likelihood that the Academy's internal control will not prevent or detect a material financial statement misstatement.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all internal control deficiencies that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider material weaknesses, as defined above.

The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters we must report under *Government Auditing Standards* which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings as items 2009-001 and 2009-002.

We also noted certain noncompliance matters not requiring inclusion in this report that we reported to the Academy's management in a separate letter dated June 24, 2010.

We intend this report solely for the information and use of management, the audit committee, the Board, and the Academy's sponsor. We intend it for no one other than these specified parties.

FINDING NUMBER 2009-001

Noncompliance Citation

Ohio Revised Code § 3314.07(A) states that the expiration of the contract for a community school between a sponsor and a school shall be the date provided in the contract. A successor contract may be entered into pursuant to division (E) of section 3314.03 of the Revised Code unless the contract is terminated or not renewed pursuant to this section.

Ohio Revised Code § 3314.03(E) requires that upon the expiration of a contract entered into under this section, the sponsor of a community school may, with the approval of the governing authority of the school, renew that contract for a period of time determined by the sponsor, but not ending earlier than the end of any school year, if the sponsor finds that the school's compliance with applicable laws and terms of the contract and the school's progress in meeting the academic goals prescribed in the contract have been satisfactory. Any contract that is renewed under this division remains subject to the provisions of sections 3314.07, 3314.072, and 3314.073 of the Revised Code.

The sponsorship agreement between Phoenix Academy and Toledo Public Schools, its sponsor, expired as of June 30, 2008. The board approved a contract, pending negotiations between Officials of Phoenix Academy and Toledo Public Schools however, as of the date of this report, they have yet to finalize a renewed sponsorship agreement.

The lack of a written sponsorship agreement between Phoenix Academy and Toledo Public Schools could result in Phoenix Academy being noncompliant with applicable laws including operating without an approved contract and be required to return all funding back to the Ohio Department of Education. It could also result in poor academic and/or fiscal performance, which could ultimately result in the closure of Phoenix Academy.

We recommend Phoenix Academy and Toledo Public Schools finalize the terms for the renewal of the sponsorship agreement or determine whether an alternative sponsor should be selected. The terms of the contract should be in writing and signed by the appropriate officials of Phoenix Academy and Toledo Public Schools. The contract should also address the expiration of the contract and terms should be addressed prior to expiration.

FINDING NUMBER 2009-002

Noncompliance Citation

Ohio Revised Code §3314.03(D) states that the contract between the governing authority of a community school and its sponsor] shall specify the duties of the sponsor which shall be in accordance with the written agreement entered into with the department of education under division (B) of section 3314.015 of the Revised Code and shall include, among other requirements, the following:

- Monitor the community school's compliance with all laws applicable to the school and with the terms
 of the contract; and
- Monitor and evaluate the academic and fiscal performance and the organization and operation of the community school on at least an annual basis.

FINDING NUMBER 2009-002 (Continued)

During fiscal year 2009, Toledo Public Schools, in its capacity as a sponsor to Phoenix Academy in failed to monitor Phoenix Academy in accordance with the aforementioned requirements.

The failure to monitor and evaluate compliance on a timely basis did result in Phoenix Academy being noncompliant with applicable laws, and could have poor academic and/or fiscal performance, which could ultimately result in the closure of the Phoenix Academy.

As a sponsor, Toledo Public Schools, should institute a system to evaluate legal, educational, and fiscal performance of Phoenix Academy.

Officials' Response

We did not receive a response from Officials to the findings reported above.

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON APPLYING AGREED-UPON PROCEDURES

To the Governing Board:

Ohio Rev. Code Section 117.53 states "the auditor of state shall identify whether the school district or community school has adopted an anti-harassment policy in accordance with Section 3313.666 of the Revised Code. This determination shall be recorded in the audit report. The auditor of state shall not prescribe the content or operation of any anti-harassment policy adopted by a school district or community school."

Accordingly, we have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were agreed to by the Board, solely to assist the Board in evaluating whether Phoenix Academy (the Academy) has adopted an anti-harassment policy in accordance with Ohio Rev. Code Section 3313.666. Management is responsible for complying with this requirement. This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of the Board. Consequently; we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

- 1. We noted the Board adopted an anti-harassment policy at its meeting on January 27, 2010.
- 2. We read the policy, noting it included the following requirements from Ohio Rev. Code Section 3313.666(B):
 - A statement prohibiting harassment, intimidation, or bullying of any student on school property or at school-sponsored events;
 - (2) A definition of harassment, intimidation, or bullying that includes the definition in division (A) of Ohio Rev. Code Section 3313.666;
 - (3) A procedure for reporting prohibited incidents;
 - (4) A requirement that school personnel report prohibited incidents of which they are aware to the school principal or other administrator designated by the principal;

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- (5) A requirement that parents or guardians of any student involved in a prohibited incident be notified and, to the extent permitted by section 3319.321 of the Revised Code and the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974," 88 Stat. 571, 20 U.S.C. 1232q, as amended, have access to any written reports pertaining to the prohibited incident;
- (6) A procedure for documenting any prohibited incident that is reported;
- (7) A procedure for responding to and investigating any reported incident;
- (8) A strategy for protecting a victim from additional harassment, intimidation, or bullying, and from retaliation following a report;
- (9) A disciplinary procedure for any student guilty of harassment, intimidation, or bullying, which shall not infringe on any student's rights under the first amendment to the Constitution of the United States:
- (10) A requirement that the school administration semiannually provide the president of the school board a written summary of all reported incidents and post the summary on its web site, if the school has a web site, to the extent permitted by section 3319.321 of the Revised Code and the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974," 88 Stat. 571, 20 U.S.C. 1232q, as amended.

We were not engaged to and did not conduct an examination, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion on compliance with the anti-harassment policy. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board and Academy's sponsor, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
